#### MURDEROUS FIEND JAILED. W. J

Petrie Makes Several Dastardly Attempts to Wreck Trains.

Bolse, Idaho, Dec. 3.-A special to the Heraid says that W. J. Petrie is now in jail at Caldwell. He confessed that he placed obstructions on the Oregon Short Line track between Langan's Spur and Notus on Friday night, Nov Spor and Notas on Priory high, 1947, 25, with the object of wrecking a pas-senger train. His capture was affect-ed by Detective M. J. Hogan, of the Short Line, and Detective W. H. Ford, watchman for the company at Pocatel, lo, who was assigned to assist Hogan. t was a tedious chase, based on filmsy clues, but it ended in victory for the Short Line officials, being among the very cleverest pieces of detective work that have been called to the public's attention in tills section for some time, Petrie, who is 25 years of age, has made a full confession. He declares he had no motive further than to wreck

a passenger train, robbery not having entered his mind. Petrie iaid three obstructions on the track. At Lannan's Spur he placed a rock weighting 100 pounds, setting it

directly on a frog. Half a mile east of here be put a rail across the track, three miles west of Notus he ridged the rails with a telephone pole. he rock and the rail were struck by freight train and moved off the track. Petrie, who was walking toward Caldwell, placed the pole on the track. track after the freight had struck the other obstructions, but fortunately it was also hit by a freight. Had a pas-senger train struck either of the ob-structions it would have been ditched. Petrie started from Caldwell for Portland on Nov. 24 with a companion, both of whom were wanted in Caldwell to testify in court, and who had found it convenient to depart at the solicitation of interested parties. In Ontario Petrie's companion became intoxicated and Petrie started back, placing the obstructions as he proceeded. He then went to a point on Boise river about fourteen miles from this city and en-gaged in trapping beaver and musk-rats. It was there Petrie was arrested

yesterday afternoon When Hogan and Ford were assigned on the case, they proceeded to Nampa, where they received a description of the would-be train wrecker, sent there from a point down the road. For two days the officers worked with this description as their only clue.
