

HOME ITEMS.

THEATRICALS:—"The Warlock of the Glen," "The Maid of Croissey" and "Darnaud, the De-nouncer" have been the attractions at the Theatre since last notice, leaving little room to complain for lack of variety. The "Warlock of the Glen" is something after the style of Anna Rad-cliff's novels, and like them excites considerable interest of a particular character. It is not exactly the "heavy" style of melo-drama, but approaches closely to it, being relieved by the braggadocio bridegroom Sandie, which Dunbar rendered most laughably. Mr. Lyne made the most of the "Warlock," a cogitomen, by the by, which is almost synonymous with wizard. The little that has to be done in the part was well done. Mr. McKenzie's Andrew was a life-like picture. The choruses were well sung, the dance went off spiritedly, the piece was well dressed, and gave much satisfaction. "The Maid of Croissey" is a neat little specimen of the minor drama. The conceited, brave and true-hearted Austerlitz is quite a character. Mr. Lyne's Austerlitz in the first act was very good; in the second act it was not so happy an effort. After being thrust through with a lance, receiving half-a-dozen balls, and spending six months in an enemy's military hospital, and then pedestrianizing five thousand miles, we would reasonably expect him to be rather weak of voice and faltering of limb. It may seem a small matter, but it goes to make the great point in the character. The piece, generally, was well played.

Dunbar's new song "When Johnny comes marching Home" was well received on Wednesday night, stood repeating on Saturday night, and would bear being sung again. The encore verses "look" immensely.

"Richelleu" is on the bills for to-night, and should draw a good house. Mr. Lyne's impersonation of the Cardinal is a very excellent performance. Go and see it, and enjoy it.

DEATH BY A GRIZZLY.—On Thursday morning, 24th inst., Bro. Thomas B. Graham was attacked by a grizzly, about three miles south-east from Mendon, Cache Valley, and killed almost instantaneously. He had gone in company with Bishop A. P. Shunway to procure some ox bows, in a large patch of haw brush, and during the time the Bishop was engaged looking around for suitable brush, the bear burst out on the old gentleman, who had laid his rifle at a short distance from him, and attacked him, dislocating his neck by the first stroke. The Bishop returned to Mendon, procured assistance and bore the mangled body home. His death is much lamented by his numerous friends.

A party of men armed with guns and accompanied with dogs started out to hunt the grizzly. They overtook him a little over a quarter of a mile from where Bro. Graham was killed. Two men rushed into the brush after him, and one of them, Daniel Hill, thrust the muzzle of his gun into the bear's mouth, but fell backwards without firing, when the bear made further into the brush, and was followed again. As he turned to attack his pursuers, a shot was fired by Jas. H. Hill into his throat which dropped him. The bear weighed over 600lbs. One cub was killed and another badly wounded.

DARING ROBBERY.—On the evening of our last issue some burglars broke into the old store of Ransohoff & Co., situate on the east side of East Temple Street. From the best evidence that can be at present obtained, it seems conclusive that the robbers entered the back premises of the aforesaid store by the window, and took from the shelves, ready-made clothing, consisting of broadcloth over and dress coats, pants and vests, of the cost value of \$1,500. Parties connected with the store could but have just left to attend the Theatre when the theft was committed, inasmuch as when they returned at intermission, they found palpable proofs of the robbery having been committed, and also of the means used to convey the stolen property away. Up to the time of our going to press, the guilty parties have eluded the vigilance of our city police, and also the country constabulary.
