> THE TINTIC SMELTER. Work on New Power Line Being

> Pushed With Vigor. Special Correspondence. Eureka, Oct. 9.—From all indications it will not be more than 20 days until

it will not be more than 20 days until the Knight smelter is in operation again, as the work of building the new power line to the smelter by the Tel-luride company is being pushed rapid-ly. Should there be any delay it will be on account of the nonarrival of the transformers from the east. Mr. Knight has completed a deal whereby he will obtain control of the water of Santaquin creek, which is capable of developing 100 horsepower and it is learned that he will put in a plant at the mouth of the Santaquin canyon for the purpose of generating plant at the mouth of the Santaquin canyon for the purpose of generating electricity. A transmission line will be built to Tintic to convey this power to the properties controlled by the Knigt interests. This will give the smelter three available electric power lines—the Utah County Power com-pany, the Telluride and the private line from Santaquin. In the meantime, the construction of the addition to the smelter is going on with a rush. Most of the material for the enlargement of the plant is upon the ground and it is stated that by the time the new power from Provo canyon is ready, the smelter will be in a position to opsmelter will be in a position to op-crate all four of the lead furnaces and ne copper furnace.
