BIG WAR IS THREATENED.

Rio Janeiro, May 11 .- Correspondence of the Associated Press .- The Gazeta de Noticios continues to publish articles calling the attention of the government to the articles published in England and the United States with regard to the vastly increased activity of the Germans in Brazil sending consuls to all the large towns, organizing banks, syndicates and companies in the states, especially southern ones, and constant visits of the ministers, consuls and agents to all the principal German colonies in the country.

It is affirmed that Peru has offered a coaling station on the Pacific to the United States beside other advantages on condition that the American government employs its good offices to obtain from Chile a modification of the supposed plan to annex Arica and Tacna

The pope sent the following telegram to Dr. Campos Salles, president of Brazil, on the occasion of the celebra-tion of the centenary of the discovery of Brazil:

On the eve of the solemn festival of the four hundredth anniversary of the discovery of Brazil we also, who well remember the visit of your excellence paid us in 1897, hasten to congratulate you, Mr. President, most cordially, and to present to you our most ardent wishes for the prosperity of the Brazilian nation, to which we dedicate an af-fection wholly sincere and special. On this occasion we send to your excellency with heartfelt satisfaction, to your government, to the confederated states. and to the whole Brazilian people our apostolic blessing.

The exact translation of the telegram sent by Emperor William of Germany to President Campos on the day of the centenary celebration is as follows: "On the day whereon you celebrate

the discovery of Brazil, it is a source of pleasure to me to present to your excellency the expression of my distinct sympathy and of my cordial desire for the felicity and progress of the friendly nation that you so worthily represent. Replying to Emperor William's con-gratulation, President Campos Salles

wrote: "I beg your majesty to accept my warmest thanks for your kind sympa-thy on the occasion of the fourth cen-tenary. I take the present occasion to offer to your majesty the expression on the part of the federal government of Brazil of the most sincere wishes fo your personal happiness and for the increasing prosperity of the German

The president's reply to the pope was

us follows: "T have the honor of thanking your holiness for the very friendly telegram, which your holiness was pleased to address on the occasion of the anni-versary of the discovery of Brazil. I sonic society. shall always guard in remembrance the extremely agreeable visit I had the honor to pay your holiness, and I beg to manifest to all my cordial thanks for your words of affection. In the name of all the Catholics of Brazil I beg your holiness to accept the expression of our heartfelt regard and warm sym-pathy for the papal blessing so kindly ent to us."
