Angry at Councilman Fernstrom He Called Him a Liar-Latter Criticised Health Department.

Another disgraceful scene occurred in the city council chamber last evening during the investigation of the nuisance complained of at the pickle factory on Third West street between Seventh and Eighth South streets by the sanitary committee. More profane language was used than during the council meeting on Monday night, which was bad enough, to say the least. Health Commissioner Stewart started the trouble last night by getting angry at Fernstrom and calling him a "--- liar" and

shaking his fist in Fernstrom's face. Hobday, backed Dr. Stewari up by making a bitter and profane speech roundly abusing Fernstrom because he dared criticise the health department for not attending to its duty.

HOBDAY STOPPED.

Tuddenham put a stop to Hobday's talk by vigorously protesting scalinst the use of such language on the floor of the council and especially towards a member of the council. Tuddenham declared that he would not stand for such talk from members and that if it were repeated again on the floor of the council he would get up and leave and take enough members with him so that there would not be a majority left to transact business. Such lan-guage he considered a disgrace to the council and he heped that it would be stopped.

HEARD COMPLAINTS.

The trouble occurred after the committee had heard the complaints of residents n ar the factory and also the

SAID IT, WAS ROT.

Hobday scored Fernstrom for introducing such a resolution, which he de-clared was nothing but "cussed rot" and was introduced through personal spite and malice against the health p. m. Auspices Real Estate Assoc'n. commissioner. He said that Fernstrom was no gentleman and did not have brains enough to come in with a cent resolution and have the matter attended to right. He wanted to know where the "filthy and unsanitary" conditions mentioned in the resolution were to be found.

Fernstrom then started to tell him where conditions complained of were located. He said that the Horseshoe bend dump was the most unsanitary and disgraceful place ever seen in the city and that its condition was caused by the health commissioner.

STEWART BREAKS OUT.

"Fernstrom, you're a hotly declared Dr. Stewart, arising from his seat and angrily shaking his fist in Fernstrom's face. Chairman O'Donnell took hold of the health commissioner's arm and told him to sit down and trouble was thus averted between the two men. Continuing, Fernstrom declared that

the people near the pickie factor; had been compelled to put up with that nuisance for several months and had complained time and again to the health department, but got no relief and at last they had decided to get out an injunction against the company and go to court. He thought it a shame that the people had to put up with such a nuisance and at last be com pelled to spend their money by fight-ing it in court in order to get relief. He blamed Dr. Stewart for not ordering the nuisance abated at once, instead of giving the company written permission to continue the nulsance for days longer to consider some plan of abating It.

Dr. Stewart stated to the committee that he had been working on the mat-ter for several months and bothered Mr. Mount a great deal about it, which statement Mr. Mount agreed, He also said that he had taken the mayor. street supervisor and several members of the council down there with him to devise some way of abating the nuis-ance but they had been unable to decide as to what action should be taken.

ABUSE FROM HOBDAY.

Hobday then began a tirade of abuse directed against Fernstrom. He said that Fernstrom's resolution makes it appear as though the "whole city rotten." "He knows that's a --- h continued Hobday, "and he knows that his resolution is a ---- dirty slanderous thing. He comes in here and makes a complaint against a legitimate in-dustry which employs a large number of men. I've never known him to live on anything except his measly little salary as councilman"---

TUDDENHAM TAKES HAND.

Tuddenham took a hand in the matter at this point and told Hobday that he had no right to make such remarks about Fernstrom and further declared that the language used by some of the members was a disgrace and he did not propose to stand for it in the fu-ture. Hobday insisted that he had a right to talk as he pleased, but Tud-denham told him in a very emphatic manner that he did not.
