LECTURE BY DAVID STARR.

President of Leland Stanford Jr. University Lectures Before the B. Y. U. Polysophical Society.

Provo, Ulah Co., Nov. 10 .- The first of the course of lectures to be delivered this season, under the ausplees of the Brigham Young University Polysophical society was given last evening in College half before a large audience by President David Starr Jordan of the Leland Stanford, Jr., university. Prof. J. C. Swenson, in introducing President Jordan, referred to the metheory of education which was no merely the attaining of culture on scholarship, but the application of cut ture and scholarship to the practice affairs of life-relating learning to life and paid a high tribute to Presiden Jordan and to the Leland Stanford, Jr. university for his and its example and nfluence in this direction.

President Jordan is an lateresting speaker, without the least hint of afreespeaker, without the least hint of affec-tation or mesumption of superiority in his manner or in his delivery. He started out by saying that this was the third time he had come to brove as a missionary. The first time was 25 years ago, when he was wort by the government to find out what kind of fish were in the Utah linke and what the government could do for the fish indus-try here.
