to Begin at Bingham Junction. Lehl, Utah, Oct. 8th—The Utah Sugar ompany has just received a special mending machine, made by the Singer Sewing Machine company for repairing filter press cloths. This machine when running at full capacity, will make 2,000 stitches per minute and is so con-structed that by a slight change it can be used for ordinary sewing, so here-after the company will have its filter cloths made right at the mill. Up to this season the factory has used over 2,000 filter bags each year, and now the factory has increased to triple its ca-pacity of last season it will require over 5,000 each year and by having these machines cloths that were discarded in the past can be mended so neatly that they will be just as good as now and can be used for a number of years. So in addition to the factory making its own filter bags in the future the ma-chines will be a great saving to the campany for mending purposes.
