CITIZENS RESPOND TO CALL.

REFUGEES GUARDING HOUSEHOLD GOODS AFTER BIG BLAZE.

Chelsea is in ashes. The recent blaze has prostrated the town and many heart-rending scenes have followed in its wake. Several were burned to death and many injured. Refugees are to be seen along all the streets guarding their household goods which had been removed from out of the fire's path. The property loss is estimated at \$5,000,000.

The city of Chelsea has been described recently as the center of the junk business of New England. It is a chartered city of Massachusetts, distant not more than three miles from the center of Boston. It is to the northeast of Boston and at the mouth of the Mystic river. Ferries and steam railways connect it with the city. The place which is called Chelsea was settled in 1626 as Winnisimmet and was a part of Boston from 1634 to 1638. It was then incorporated as a town.

The principal public buildings were the court house, city hall, the United States naval and marine hospitals, the Soldiers' Home, the Fritz public library and the Odd Fellows and Masonic halls. Union Park and the public playgrounds are the city's spaces.

Chelsea has a population of 40,000. The section which was burned is mostly inhabited by Jews, who have built up in the western part of the city probably the largest rag shop district in the world. Most of the buildings from West Third street, where the fire began, to the water front facing East Boston are of wood. In this district there have been numerous destructive fires during the last few years, which generally on investigation have proved to be of incendiary origin.

BURGLAR LEAVES HASTILY.

There was a burglar scare at the residence of Mrs. Abner Luman, 679 east Second South street, at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon, and the patrol wagon made one of the quickest runs it ever made in getting to the place. Mrs. Luman was alone in the house and heard someone walking in the hall downstairs. She looked over the banister and saw a man enter the dining room. She quickly went downstairs and hurried over to a grocery store and phoned the police. Several men in the neighborhood, armed with rocks, clubs, hoes and rakes, surrounded the house and when the patrol wagon or police officers reached the scene a careful search for the daylight robber was made, but he had escaped. POLICE FINALLY MAKE AN ARREST

Two Suspected Men Are Taken
After Rooming House
Robbery.

STOLEN PROPERTY IS FOUND

Benson and Peterson May Be Charged
With Stealing Varied Assortment
Of Notions and Money.

Police Officers Kelly and Tiler made an important capture early this morning when they arrested two men giving the names of Ed Benson and George Peterson on the charge of burglary in the second degree. The men are accused of entering a room in the Belmont hotel and stealing from William Miller and John Lawson, a watch, a razor, a brush and comb, a pocket-knife, a pocketbook, a hat, a pair of shoes and between \$6 and \$7 in cash.

The men were arrested before the robbery was reported to the police. Officers Kelly and Tiler saw the two men on the streets and as the fellows looked suspicious they were placed under arrest. Some of the stolen property was found on them when searched at headquarters. Then came the report of the robbery and upon further investigation the police learned that Benson and Peterson had committed the crime. They will be charged with burglary in the second degree.

DOCTOR WRIGHT BLAMELESS.

Dr. E. S. Wright was granted his motion for non-suit in the case brought against him in the Third district court by Daniel Conley, who charged malpractice. Conley alleged in his complaint that a broken leg had been shortened after Dr. Wright had reduced the fracture and suit was brought to recover \$10,000 damages.

Dr. Plummer and Dr. Mayo, called as witnesses for the plaintiff, were told all circumstances in connection with the treatment received by Conley at the hands of Dr. Wright and their conclusion was, as a broken leg, that the fracture had been handled with skill. It was shown that in all cases of an oblique fracture of the leg bones, upon setting the injured portions a shortening would invariably result from the very nature of the injury.

FARMINGTON WEDDING SEQUEL.

Annie Lewis yesterday filed suit for divorce from her husband, J. R. Lewis, alleging failure to provide for the ground for the action. The couple were married at Farmington, Aug. 10, 1904, and Mrs. Lewis says she has failed to support her since the first of the present year. She further alleges that Lewis owns real property worth \$3,000 and other property worth \$7,000. She asks for \$20 per month alimony and the possession of household effects. Lewis has entered an appearance and waived time for pleading.

SENTENCE AFFECTS JOHNSON.

William Johnson, arrested for stealing brass, was arraigned before Judge Diehl yesterday afternoon and pleaded guilty to the charge of petit larceny. He was sentenced to 30 days in the city jail at hard labor. The sentence was a severe blow to Johnson, who trembled violently for several minutes after judgment was pronounced.

TRUSTY STEALS HARNES.

William Gratton, a vag and thief, a man who has a most unsavory police record, is on trial in Judge Diehl's court this afternoon on the charge of petit larceny. Gratton is at the present time a trusty at the city jail, serving a sentence for larceny. It is alleged that he left the jail a day or two ago and stole a harness from A. Meyer.
