SOUTH TEMPLE PAVING.

Committee Wants a Ten-Year Contract—Keley's Trip East.

The council committee on streets last evening considered the matter of paving South Temple street from State to Tenth East. It was urged that to pave the entire street in one year would impose a hardship on many of the property owners, so the committee instructed the city engineer to ascertain whether or not the city could enter into a 10-year contract with some paving company. If such a step can be taken, the paving will be done this year; if not, the city will have to wait until the next year, when the entire paving is completed, and thereby greatly relieve the burden upon property owners.

The members of the finance committee will submit both a majority and minority report on the advisability of sending City Engineer Keley east, at an expense to the city of \$300, to inspect the latest municipal improvements in the large cities in the northwest, waterworks, street paving and parking, with a view to modernizing the public improvements in this city in the future. President Cottrell will submit a minority report on the ground that the city is not financially able to stand the expense of the "junkie," as he terms the proposed trip.

NO ADMISSION.

Smallpox Patient is Sent Back Home for Treatment.

The board of health yesterday received a call from a young man from Farmington, who has the smallpox, and came here for the express purpose, it is said, of going to the isolation hospital at the city's expense. Clerk Horace Smith was forewarned that the young man was coming and when he presented himself at the city hall, he was refused admission. The man's name is Wilford Birmingham and it is said that his friends at Farmington advised him to come here and get into the isolation hospital. He at first represented to the clerk that he had the smallpox, but later confessed that he had just arrived from the north. He was then ordered to return to his home.

Other cases of smallpox reported to the board of health yesterday are: Almonzo Marchant, 615 south Third East; John Selker, aged 32, an employee of a rock quarry in Parley's canyon; George B. Smith, aged two years, 221 north Fourth West.
