PANAMA CANAL ZONE.

Taft and Walker Give Opinions **Regarding its Government**

Washington, March 18 .- Secretary Taft was heard today by the house committee on interstate and foreign commerce on the subject of constructng the Panama canal. The secretary

favored the pending Lovering bill for the government of the canal zone. Secretary Taft was also questioned by members of the committee regard. ing his views as to the proposed meth ods of expending the money for the construction of the canal. He said the president primarily was responsi-ble for this large sum of money, but the gigantic proportions of the work and the duties of the president otherwise made it, of course, impossible for him to give his personal attention to such matters.

In the commission the president un-In the commission the president un-doubtedly had made the proper delega-tion of his authority on this subject. If there was any question as to this, the secretary said that contracts in ex-cess of \$2,000,000, for instance, might be referred to the secretary of war or norme other member of the president's some other member of the president's cabinet or other person whom the president might designate for review. The engineering features of the work would make the secretary of war the most available and best equipped official for this work.

In answer to a question by Chairman Hepburn as to whether a requirement should be made that each member of the commission shoud reside on the the commission should reside on the canal strip. Secy. Taft smilingly replied that from his own experience of life in the tropics he knew that such life could be made very pleasant. "With the amount of money which the canal commission will have at hand I should imagine they should be able to make life outto attractive on the

to make life quite attractive on the canal zone," he continued.

Admiral Walker made a detailed de-scription of the methods of expending money by the last canal commission, of which he was president. He said that President McKinley had delegated him as the executive head of the com-mission and when the committee organized the entire supervision of the expenditure of money was left in his hands. No resolution ever was passed by the commission regarding the policy of expending money or the details of any single expenditure.

Following a line of questions asked by Chairman Hepburn regarding the selection of canal routes recommended by the commission, Admiral Walker explained that the law required the commission to select the route most feasible and economical which the Unifed States could own and operate. Nicaragua was selected first because \$100,000,000 was asked for the Panama concession by the French company, which put that route entirely out of the question as compared with Nicaragua. When the price was reduced to \$40,000,-000 and title assured, the conditions were changed and the commission re-ported in favor of the Panama route. The hearings will be continued on Mon-
