Miss Madge Westerfield, daughter of Samuel B. Westerfield, is lying seriously ill at Topeka, Kansas, where she has been attending school. Her many friends earnestly hope for her recovery.

H. L. A. Culmer and Photographer Whitaker expect to leave Friday night for their trip to the Grand canyon. Artist Culmer intends to get material for some handsome paintings of Grand canyon scenery while on this trip.

State Recorder of Marks and Brands Tingey has his regular office force and a night force employed copying the brand records preparatory to compiling them. The work of copying will be completed in about thirty days.

The funeral of Norton Curtis, the prisoner who died at the penitentiary June 15, was held yesterday afternoon from the prison. Rev. Clarence T. Brown conducted the services, and music was furnished by the choir of the First Methodist church and by Miss Julia Hunkins and Mrs. C. L. Wood. There were many beautiful floral offerings.

The Fin de Siecle fair, conducted by the ladies of the A. M. E. church, closed last night. It was a successful enterprise, netting nearly \$250 to the church building fund. The prizes offered for the most popular ladies were won as follows: Cheesecake, Mrs. John Burns; rice, Mrs. W. W. Taylor; pillow case, Mrs. A. Calloway.

At a largely attended meeting of the Salt Lake Butchers' association last night, it was decided to close the shops at noon every Thursday during the month of June, July and August. This is for the purpose of giving the clerks and other employees an opportunity for such recreation with their families as they desire. There were thirty-five members present and the vote on the closing proposition was unanimous.

The New York Life Insurance company, through W. H. Booth Jr., the local manager, has paid to C. L. Wood, administrator of the estate of R. C. Chambers, life insurance on Mr. Chambers' life, amounting to \$100,000. It was carried in four policies, the largest one being for \$50,000. Mr. Chambers also had \$20,000 in the Northwestern, \$25,000 in the Equitable and \$10,000 in the Pacific Mutual, making a total of \$109,000.

An interesting meeting was held by the Elks last evening. Four new members were initiated into the order and Captain F. S. Stoll was appointed director general of the coming street fair. The committee on the street fair reported that the property owners on West Temple and Third South streets have consented to close those streets for use for the fair. Lawrence Fahy, an employee of the B. & O. Transfer company, living at 22 South Second West street, was injured in the eyes yesterday afternoon while working at the Oregon Short Line freight depot. He was engaged in reloading some Fourth of July goods for a local merchant, when one of the

torpedo boxes exploded, throwing splinters of wood and sawdust into his eyes. He was totally blinded at first and was taken to Dr. G. B. Ploutz. The doctor worked with him for a half an hour and succeeded in clearing the sight to a great extent. By taking great care Fahy will be able to preserve his sight.

In all probability J. B. Henderson, who got away with the diamond gold watch, and money belonging to Cal Wood, which the latter had placed in a money box at the Sanitarium last Monday night, will not be prosecuted. Assistant County Attorney Lofthouse, who has been investigating the case, is of the opinion that Henderson is perfectly innocent of any bad intent. It transpires that Henderson disclaimed ownership of the valuables to the clerk at the Sanitarium but the latter insisted that he had the right box. It is also a fact that Cal Wood could not tell within \$100 how much he really did have in cash. Attorney Lofthouse thinks that Henderson was on his way to return the valuables when he was arrested and that he used only \$10 or \$12 of the money belonging to Mr. Wood.

FOOLHARDY BOYS.

Dangerous Practice Indulged in by Amateur Electricians.

Samuel Cooke, James Douglas and Alva Graham, the three Murray boys who were arrested for tampering with the main trolley wire of the Utah Light and Power company, were arraigned before Justice McMillan yesterday at Murray. Samuel Cooke and James Douglas pleaded guilty and Justice McMillan suspended sentence during their good behavior, owing to the fact that both boys are so young. It was shown to the satisfaction of the court that the older boy, Alva Graham, was innocent of the charge, and he was acquitted.

The Utah Light and Power company has been annoyed several times by boys who have interfered with the wires by diverting the current through copper wires thrown over the main lines. They intend to prosecute fully any more offenders.

How dangerous an amusement it is came out at the trial. The two boys climbed a tree near one of the poles, fastened a copper wire to a stick and then hung it over the wires. For a number of moments the whole surrounding country was ablaze. The copper wire placed on the main wire being smaller than the main wire and being so close to it, it was a wonder that both boys were not killed and though they will not admit it, it is believed that they received a bad shock as one of them fell from the tree and was much shaken up. This is the first arrest that has been made by the company and future offenders will be severely dealt with.

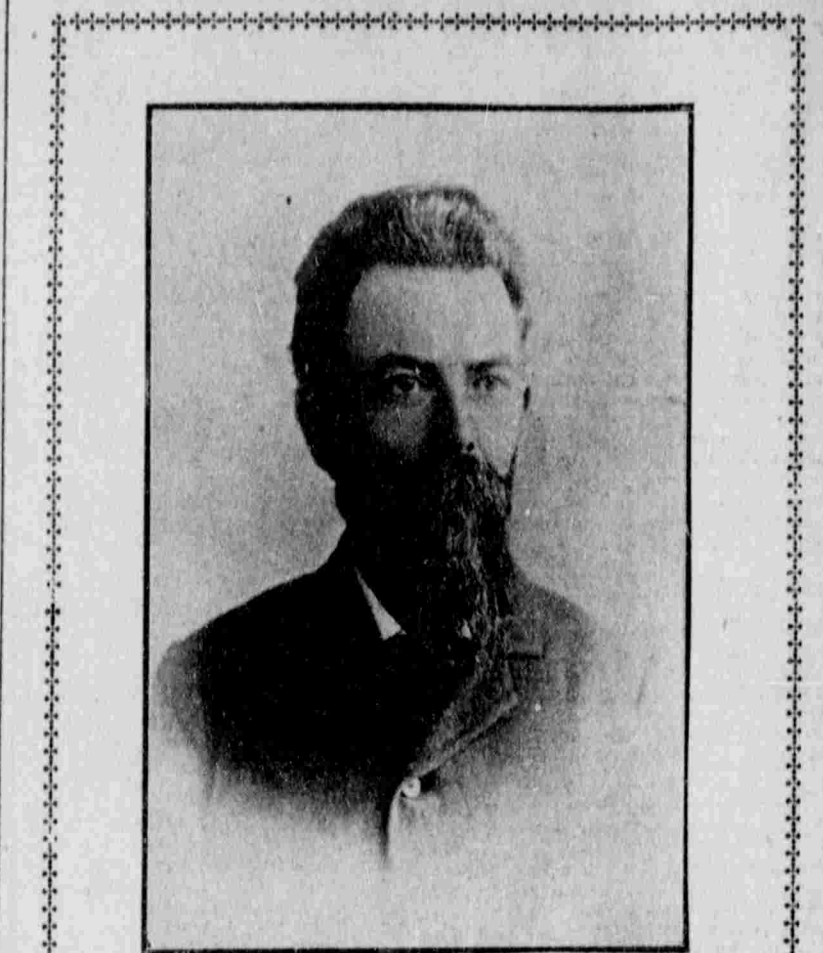

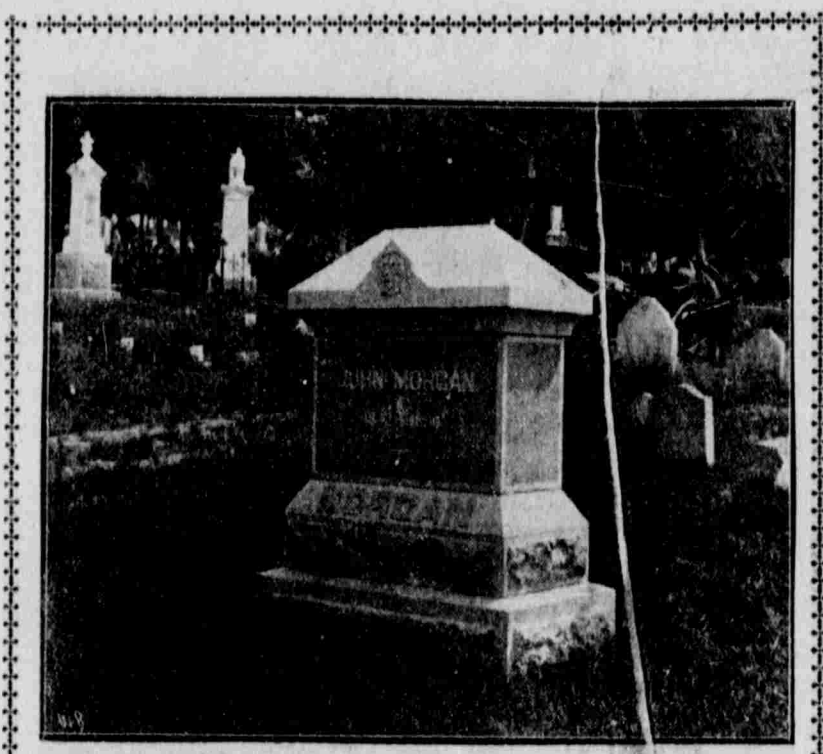

THE LATE PRESIDENT JOHN MORGAN.

President John Morgan was born in Greengrove, Indiana, in 1842. He received a good education in his youth, and when the war of the rebellion broke out, he enlisted in the Union army. He was as gallant a soldier as ever fought, and at the close of the war was offered a captaincy in the regular army but he modestly declined, saying that he only cared to be a soldier when his country was in danger. There are innumerable stories of his intrepid conduct on the field of battle and one that is sometimes related by his friends is an account of how he rescued the colors of his company after two men that were bearing them had been shot dead. He scaled the earthworks like Sergeant Jasper and brought back the colors in triumph though they were torn to ribbons by bullets. The tattered remnant is still in possession of the Morgan family.

In 1867 he joined the "Mormon" Church and was one of its ablest advocates up to the time of his death. He was ordained one of the First Council of Seventies in 1884, to succeed William W. Taylor, deceased. He achieved his proudest record as president of the Southern States mission which he practically organized. He was an exceptionally successful missionary and to this day he is dear to the hearts of hundreds of people in the Southern States. He was the son-in-law of the late Nicholas Groesbeck, and died at Preston, Idaho, on July 14, 1894, of typhoid pneumonia.



MONUMENT ERECTED TO THE MEMORY OF JOHN MORGAN.

This handsome monument is the result of the joint labors of the First Council of Seventies and the Elders of the Southern States mission, who labored there under the presidency of John Morgan, which covered a period of fourteen years. The committee that had the monument in charge consisted of B. H. Roberts, chairman; J. Golden Kimball, William Spry, Elias Kimball, Ben E. Rich, all of whom have presided over the Southern States mission. The monument is made of polished granite and cost \$300. The probabilities are that further subscriptions will be raised to create a permanent fund. The interest of which will be used to keep the grave and plot in good condition. The monument, as stated elsewhere in the "News," was dedicated this afternoon with impressive and appropriate ceremony.

OFFENSIVE PELTS.

Attorney General Breeden Delivers an Opinion Regarding the Matter.

Attorney General Breeden this afternoon handed down an opinion regarding the bounty upon wild animals. It appears that William Hurst, county clerk for Beaver county, has asked whether it is necessary for the claimant for a bounty to produce the entire pelt, as under the existing law and hot weather some very offensive specimens are at times handed into the county clerk's office.

In his opinion the attorney general will undoubtedly relieve the feelings and incidentally the olfactory nerves of the county clerks at large. He says: It is not necessary to exhibit the entire skin; the ears entire and a strip down the back with the tail attached. This can be done in such a manner as to rid it of its offensiveness, or most of it, even in hot weather; but conceding that it may be offensive, the law seems plain and unambiguous and your duties are well and clearly defined by it.

Therefore, you are advised that sections 2 and 3 of chapter 137, Sessions Laws of 1901, require that anyone desiring to claim the bounty on wild animals, named in section 1, of said chapter, must exhibit the scalp with the ears entire and tail connected with the animal to the county clerk, before said clerk is authorized to issue the certificate as required by section 4 of said chapter.

VARIOUS COURT CASES.

Real Estate Agent Houston, who has been acting as special administrator of the estate of William D. Palmer, who died on May 11th, yesterday applied for general letters of administration. The hearing was set for June 10th. Mr. Palmer left property consisting of ten improved pieces of land valued at \$44,450, and \$5,000 in cash and notes. All of the heirs live in Georgia. They are a brother, aged 65 years; a sister, 62, and a nephew of 23 years. An untraced child of a will was filed with the petition for letters of administration, by which the decedent bequeathed to the heirs and to Hubert Culbertson property on the east side of Main street between Fourth and Fifth South, and the balance of his holdings to Mrs. Emma Reed for her careful and kind attention to him when Mr. Palmer was ill some years ago. Mr. Palmer, however, conveyed to Mrs. Reed property on east Second South street, and she joins
