CHRIST AND MAN.

How far the attainment of Christ is available in its application to man's redemption, is a question that has been discussed in the light of theory, and of revelation. On the possibility and hope of redemption depends entirely the virtue and efficacy of the atonement. It is, therefore, the Alpha and Omega of the Christian religion. And without a correct understanding of this principle, there can be no true faith, and no true repentance, and no true obedience to the Father's will.

From the condition entailed upon the entire human race by the transgression of Adam, it was foreseen that all should be redeemed through the atonement of Christ. It is in this sense that the Father's promise, "in whom all life should be made alive and come back into His Kingdom," is fulfilled.
