## KEEP THEM SEPARATE!

The Economy in Uniting Higher Educational Institutions is Largely Imaginary, the Benefits to the Causes Are Purely Fictional.

*Editor's Special Note:*

I have read with much care the article and misleading answer of Dr. Kingbury in my copy of *the Tribune* in your paper. Below the course of instruction in this college was organized I visited Dr. Parkhill, President of the University, to discuss with him the course of the two institutions, with the purpose of organizing this upon new grounds. Mathews, along similarly, with very slight symptoms of friction only, until the last Legislature met, when these associated with the University attempted the appropriation of the Agricultural College, but did not convince the broad-minded gentlemen who composed the Legislature. During the past summer I suggested to President Kingbury that the two institutions occupied clearly marked fields, that their interests were mutual, that they could work in harmony, and that we could ready to do joint work with them to the purpose of economy. To this query I received no response. In the meanwhile I have learned of members of the faculty of the University, in different parts of the Territory, acting explicitly and in full measure in accordance with the principles, stating that that would be virtual links City.

President Kingbury has written to various members of the Legislature, probably all of them, asking them to supply a desire for their committee upon his part as spokesman. He underestimates them. Pamphlets from the University have been extensively circulated, and the same statement is made in every article. That have been made upon this institution by me, have reason to believe, never taken up in the faculty of the University, or in any of its publications. Dr. Kingbury, to my mind, Dr. Kingbury is the only faculty as a committee committee, are surely working for union with the purpose of forming that union at Salt Lake City.

After four years of great attention to our own affairs, we have now turned to private friendly relations between the two institutions, as far as I am forced to enter the field in the interest of the industrial classes of this Territory, this institution, and in fact, the whole country.

The public will pardon me, under the circumstances, if my language is direct.

As one of the taxpayers of the Territory I should feel more grateful for the public school system than any other, but the economy did not consider that the appropriation by the last Legislature for this institution, was used to advance the cause of the faculty, they have not yet given credit enough to those of the Agricultural College, and in reducing the amount of class room service until that of this institution is about thirty-three per cent, great distress has been given by the University, especially. This greater opportunity for the expenditure of the people's money, may be further emphasized by the opportunity to prove the course of instruction, for the 81 preparatory students examined at Salt Lake City, of whom 60 had received tuition fees, while the remaining 21 received tuition fees, and located in separate places and left us, as before, after basic.

**IN UNION ECONOMY?**

It will take square issues upon the question of union, whether that one president will suffice in the university, in lieu of two or separate colleges; but the presidents of universities frequently draw more than three as equal as the president of separate colleges, which affords only a slight advantage by legislative communities to those in popular classes. He might have investigated seven other universities, every one of which the weight of the institution lies in its industrial department from the time it was founded and located it at the University. Of its 21 normal students to two from Salt Lake City, the greater portion of whom could have received as good instruction in her schools as in popular classes. The character of this attendance is shown in the fact that by 60 resumed the winter year. Of the 81 real college students at the University of 27 from Salt Lake City, including the two-thirds of our students received the second largest portion of their education in the schools of Salt Lake City. One hundred and sixty of the 300 students were from Salt Lake City, two-thirds of whom were received at the University of Salt Lake City, and one of whom came to the University because it is a student of the University.

Now the preparatory department of the University, a necessity for Salt Lake City takes the活力 of the state out of tuition into her high schools. Our preparatory department is less than three times this. The industrial college reaches down to a different class. Its students almost wholly come from the vicinity districts and very largely from districts where the schools are very poorly provided. They are of such size that the total number of students which have not been graduated from them, and I sincerely believe that the education in our preparatory department at three young men is one of the very valuable works that we are doing in this Territory and one that cannot be paralleled elsewhere.

Dr. Kingbury writes admiringly for I am sure without meaning. Without information, and only one, on the part of the author of that discussion, I might say a few words, just to give the reader a statement that \$100,000-\$200,000 could be saved annually by uniting the two institutions. The total sum received from the institution for raising money during the past financial period was \$10,000,000, and \$100,000-\$200,000, says of which was unexpended.
