TO RECLAIM 10,000 ACRES.

The state board of land commissioners yesterday selected a tract containing 10,000 acres of arid land belong ties, to be reclaimed under the \$250,000 irrigation project recently undertaken by the land board. The selection is part of the reservoir land grant given to the state by the government in the enabling act. When the dams and reservoirs to be built by the state on the Sector river by which this tract reservoirs to be built by the state on the Sevier river, by which this tract will be irrigated, are completed, the lands which are now practically value-less, will be equal to any irrigated land in the state. It is estimated that water rights will not cost much to ex-ceed \$30 per acre to settlers, which is below the average.
