

JOHNSON KILLED, HERMAN WOUNDED.

Crew of the Boat in Which the
Embezzling Constabulary Offi-
cers Escaped Attacked Them.

FOUR OF THE CREW WERE SLAIN

Surviving Outlaw Put Back to Negroes
And is Supposed to be Hiding
In Nabava, Bayanan.

Manila, Oct. 14, 6:20 p. m.—The crew of the boat in which Johnson and Herman, the runaway constabulary officers, accompanied by one constable, started from Gumbal for Cagayanes island, attacked the outlaws on nearing the latter place, killing Johnson and wounding Herman and the constable. Herman killed four of the crew and the other two jumped overboard. He then put back to Negroes, where he sent guns and ammunition to the police and abandoned the boat. Nabava, Bayanan, where he was in hiding when the last was heard of him. On Saturday night last the police captured the boat, recovering a number of constabulary guns, ammunition and some money. They also buried Johnson, whose body was found in the boat. It is presumed that the crew intended to kill the outlaws and secure their money and arms.

ATTACKED BY LABOR LEADERS

Donnelly's Offense Was Trying to
Pacify Chicago Fed. of Labor.

Chicago, Oct. 14.—Michael Donnelly, international president of the Amalgamated Meat-Cutters' and Butchers' Workmen, lies at home recovering from a vicious assault that is alleged to have been instigated by the labor leaders who are opposing his attempts to purify the Chicago Federation of Labor.

Donnelly was attacked on the night of Sept. 22 while returning from a meeting of the Packing Trades Council, the Central Trade union body of the stockyards. For 10 days the doctors expressed little hope of his recovery and gave out report that he was suffering from a physical breakdown caused by overwork.

Private detectives were set at work and they have just announced that the guilty men are known and will be arrested as soon as the instigators of the assault are discovered.

When Donnelly, on July 5, charged the secretary of the employers' association with "fixing" labor leaders he was told by outside parties to "keep his hands off." He continued the fight, and as a result charges were made against several of the most prominent officials of trade unions in the city. Then came threats of personal violence, but these Donnelly ignored, declaring that he would clear up the case at any cost.

The attack on Donnelly came just at the opening of the series of conferences between the Amalgamated Meat-Cutters and Butchers' Workmen and the packing interests of the country. Donnelly was to have acted as spokesman for the men and all knew that his absence from the meetings would mean demoralization. His close advisers and the officials of the union realized this and gave out the report that he was temporarily ill. Vice President C. E. Schmidt of the union took his place as the head of the committee, which dealt with the packers and the men were pacified with the information that he was working under Donnelly's orders.

Another Advance in Diamonds.

New York, Oct. 14.—Leading diamond merchants in this city have received cable advice from their brokers in London, Amsterdam and Antwerp that the diamond selling syndicate of the De Beers company of South Africa has advanced the price on all small "rough" goods 5 per cent, and the price of the larger rough diamond 10 per cent. The syndicate handles the output of the De Beers company, which produces, it is said, about 95 per cent of the total output of the world.

The advance is the third since February, and diamonds are now selling higher than they have been at any time since the consolidation of the South African mines in the seventies.

Accompanying the cables came advice from the diamond market centers of Europe, indicating that conditions there are unprecedented for 30 years.

Kruger Celebrates His Birthday.

New York, Oct. 14.—Ex-President Kruger has celebrated his seventy-eighth birthday with a small family feast, the first since the war, says a Paris dispatch to the Times.

Ex-President Steyn and his family are living in a modest villa near Cape Town. He suffers from paralysis of the limbs and is condemned to absolute rest.

Man Who Sold Indians Whisky.

Butte, Mont., Oct. 14.—A special to the Miner from Browning, Mont., says the authorities on the Blackfoot reservation believe that they have located the man who sold the whisky to the Indians that led to the terrible murders of Sunday morning, and Jake Williamson of Butte, who is alleged to have been guilty of having violated the law in this respect. He was brought to Browning by Deputy U. S. Marshal Wall.

A preliminary examination was held by the U. S. commissioner, Williamson waived examination and was bound over to the United States grand jury in the sum of \$1,000, which he succeeded in securing. Nothing material has been further learned regarding the suspected murderer.

Well Dressed Man Suicides.

Stockton, Cal., Oct. 14.—A well-dressed man, who gave his name as J. W. Eames and said he was from St. Louis, committed suicide by jumping off the steamer California at Stockton, Cal., on his passage up from San Francisco to this city.

Suicide Identified.

San Francisco, Oct. 14.—The man who committed suicide in a King street lumber yard on last Saturday has been identified as Eames, late of Chicago. He wrote to friends in that city on the night before he shot himself, stating that he intended to take his own life.

Extraordinary Sun Spots.

Washington, Oct. 14.—The United States national observatory today made observations of the extraordinary group of solar spots now visible on the sun, the largest group discovered in the last decade. The observations are under the direction of Geo. H. Peters, who made the following statement today:

"The enormous group was again observed with a photo-heliograph yesterday and today. The individual spots comprising the group have become less numerous, some of the smaller spots having consolidated with others. The group consists of about nine spots in all and now shows indications of condensing into two principal spots or groups somewhat separated."

"Yesterday the total length of the disturbed region was 172,000 miles, with a width of about 39,000 miles, the aggregate length of the principal spots being 123,000 miles. The group was easily seen by the naked eye at the naval observatory by several of the astronomers and ought to be a conspicuous object for several days yet."

"A brilliant aurora was observed last evening, a bright glow in the heavens near the northern horizon, while intense streams shot up toward the zenith. These conspicuous auroras of ten accompany the appearance of large sun spots. The magnetic conditions of the earth are affected, producing a considerable disturbance of the magnetic needle."

Indianapolis Goes Democratic.

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 13.—Unofficial returns from the city election indicate the election of John W. Holtzman, Democratic candidate for mayor, over Charles A. Bookwalter, the present Republican mayor.

The rest of the ticket is doubtful. Out of 227 voting precincts official returns from 224 precincts give Holtzman 20,212; Bookwalter 19,208; Hitz, Prohibition and Independent, 5,267. Plurality for Holtzman, 1,004.

The campaign has been one of the most spirited in the history of the city, and the vote polled was the heaviest ever cast. A strong Republican following did not support Mayor Bookwalter on account of antagonism to the administration.

Cracker Bakers' Strike Fails.

Chicago, Oct. 13.—Cracker bakers, after a five months' contest against the National Biscuit company, today acknowledged the failure of their strike. Practically all the union bakers who participated appeared at the office of the company and made formal application for their former positions. The girl cracker packers and the shipper's and receiver's unions have decided to continue the contest.

Won't Support Fusion Ticket.

New York, Oct. 13.—The Greater New York Democracy of Staten Island has decided to withdraw its support from the fusion ticket and endorse the regular Democratic nominees. The organization opposed Tammany two years ago and its members worked and voted for the fusion ticket.

Crude Oil Goes Up.

Lima, O., Oct. 13.—The third advance for the month was made in crude oil today, prices of western oil going up two cents, while 3 cents was added to the quotations on eastern products. The advance did not result in active selling. Quotations now are: Titon, \$1.83; Pennsylvania, \$1.68; Corning, \$1.48; Newcastle, \$1.55; North Lima, \$1.26; South Lima and Indiana, \$1.21; White House, \$1.25; Nevelsha, Kan., \$1.26; Somerset, \$1.21; Ragland, Ky., 61 cents.

Dowdies Are Gathering.

Chicago, Oct. 13.—Followers of John Alexander Dowdie are gathering in great numbers in Zion City today in preparation for the start tomorrow of the "restoration army" for New York. 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Soon After Midnight, Took Him
From Jail and Hanged Him.

Hamilton, Mont., Oct. 14.—Walter Jackson, the convicted murderer of Little Fonnie Buck, a 6-year-old boy, was taken from the county jail here late last night by a mob and lynched.

Shortly before midnight 75 masked men, all armed with rifles or shot-guns, forced their way through the rear of the jail and overpowered Jailer Stephens, who was able to offer but slight resistance. They soon found Jackson, who was cowering in the darkest portion of his cell. Jackson pleaded piteously for mercy but he was rushed out into the street where the mob had already provided themselves with a rope. This was quickly thrown over an electric light pole and the noose placed about Jackson's neck. He was asked if he had anything to say, but he only pleaded for mercy. The mob then pulled him into the air after which they quietly dispersed. Not a shot was fired. The identity of the mob leaders is unknown. Thirty-five minutes after the lynching, Jackson's body was cut down by the sheriff and coroner and removed to the morgue.

The murder of Little Fonnie Buck was a peculiarly atrocious crime. When the boy's body was found it was horribly mutilated. Suspicion pointed to Jackson and when he was arrested a lynching was narrowly averted. His trial quickly followed and a verdict was returned within two hours. He was sentenced to be hanged but his attorneys appealed to the supreme court.

Booker Washington to Negroes.

New York, Oct. 13.—Booker T. Washington, just back from a short vacation in Europe, has been welcomed home at a meeting of 3,000 negroes here, in response to numerous addresses, he in responding to the negroes here are much better than the poorer classes get on the other side.

"The poorer classes there," he said, "save more money than the colored people here, although they earn less. On the other hand, in point of general morality, I think that our people here compare favorably with the lower classes of Europe."

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Picture of the Empress Removed.

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Wilkesbarre, Pa., Oct. 14.—A little gamecock has caused the death of John Gruener of this city. The rooster had been fitted with a steel spur for fighting. While teasing the bird two weeks ago Gruener thrust his foot toward it. While in a vigorous defense the spur was driven through Gruener's shoe. He paid no attention to the wound. Lockjaw developed and he died.

Rose Roberts Suicides.

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The woman had declared she saw herself, in the dream, hanging dead in a dark room. The dream haunted her night and day and finally she destroyed herself.

Changes in Harvester Trust.

Chicago, Oct. 14.—The Tribune today says:

Radical changes in the offices of the International Harvester company, by which the offices of the constituent companies will be consolidated, are being put into effect by the directing officials of the big combine. It is stated that the plan will be in force by Jan. 1, though thus far it has been kept a closely guarded secret.

By this consolidation step, which will extend throughout the country to all cities and towns where the McCormick, Case and other companies have offices, it is expected that the salaries of several thousand employees will be reduced to the combine amounting to hundreds of thousands of dollars annually.

It will be the policy of the company, it was stated, to keep the best employees in all the offices.

For the Cincinnati district W. D. Adams, the present general agent of the Champion branch, will be the general manager under the new system, and S. C. Ritter, the general agent of the Des Moines company, will be made the new general agent. The saving there is estimated at \$500,000 a year.
