AT THE FLAGSTAFF

New Management Will Begin Work on The Old Adit.

Everard Bierer, Jr., the attorney for the Flagstaff Mining company at Alta, "cturned from that camp last evening. The judge went to Alta for the purpose I inspecting the work now being done by the Mickigan crowd which has bond-ed the Flagstaff and who have been working the mine since last April. He reports that the property is looking fine and that the company now in charge is paying out as fast as payments fal due. There is no question but that the old producer will again come to the fore. All prospecting work in the up-per workings has been completed and active development will now be instiactive development will now be insti-tuted in the lower levels. This work will be presecuted through the old Flag-staff adit, which opens some 1,500 feet east of the Columbus. This tunnel is now in 360 feet, and the proposition is to push if at once 1,500 feet, cutting the year from 300 to 400 feet below the up-per workings. Work is now under way constructing mining buildings near the mouth of the adit. Several care loade

constructing mining buildings near the mouth of the adit. Several car loads of lumber are in transit from Sandy to the mine, and a large force of work-men are employed putting up the build-ings so as to have them ready before heavy winter, weather sets in. The judge says that work in the adit will commence at once, and that as large a force of men as can be put to work will be kent at it all winter. The energies be kept at it all winter. The energies of the company will be wholly directed in the tunnel, and but little more work will be done below.
