LOCAL BRIEFS.

HARPER ARRESTED AGAIN.

Former Sheriff Kelly of Deseret Gets Penny Murder Suspect.

A special dispatch from Cheyenne, Wyo., states that former Sheriff Virgil Kelly of Deseret, Utah, yesterday located and placed under arrest W. H. Harper, charged with the murder of W. H. Penny and his son, George, in Millard county in November, 1898. Kelly had been searching for Harper for 10 years, and soon after the murder traced Harper and his wife 800 miles to Wilcox, Arizona, then back to Utah and arrested them. The accused were bound over to the grand jury on habeas corpus in 1899, as the bodies were not yet recovered. What was believed to be the remains were excavated a year and a half ago, and a warrant for Harper was again issued. Kelly was employed at Cheyenne as a contractor, recognized Harper as the doctor, and had the arrest made. Utah officers were notified to go to Cheyenne to get the prisoner, whose wife is still at large. Harper declined to talk.

PLANS ARE ARRANGED FOR MEMORIAL DAY

Patriotic Societies Will Visit All Cemeteries—Children Asked To Provide Flowers.

Plans for the observance of Memorial day were completed at a meeting held last evening by the general committee of the G. A. R. The arrangements made are as follows: Members of George R. Maxwell post, No. 5, and the Maxwell Women's Relief corps, together with the Spanish War veterans, will meet at the city cemetery at 9 o'clock. The Ladies of the G. A. R., Sons of Veterans and Daughters of Veterans will meet at Smith's drug store, at the corner of Main and Second South, not later than 8 o'clock, in order to take the car leaving at that time for Port Douglas. Members of the G. A. R. post, No. 1, will meet at Mt. Oliver cemetery at 10 o'clock.

A store room in the Brooks arcade building has been secured for raising and arranging the flowers to be used for decorative purposes. This room will be open Saturday afternoon, May 29, all day Sunday and again at 10 o'clock Monday morning. All who have flowers to contribute are requested to bring them to this room on Saturday and Sunday.

The committee decided upon certain schools as distributing centers, and children are requested to bring the flowers to the following school buildings before 1 o'clock Saturday afternoon: The Emerson school, Hamilton, Sumner, Ogden, Webster, Washington, Lafayette, Lowell, Longfellow, Wasatch and Bryant. The janitors of these schools are requested to leave the school buildings open for these contributions.

The committee especially requests principals and teachers of the schools of this city to call the attention of the pupils to the necessity for bringing flowers for decorative purposes to these schools, and to use their influence to have the children bring all the flowers possible. It has been suggested that a considerable quantity of wild flowers might be gathered by the children, from the east bench, usual charge of vagrancy will be made against them.
