LOCAL BRIEFS.

The One Hundred Tenth quorum of Seventy will give a reunion in the Sixth ward assembly room on Monday night next. Supper will be served at 7:30, after which there will be a program and dancing.

WHAT IT COSTS TO RUN THE SCHOOLS.

Estimate for Next Year, Amounting to \$514,000, Approved by Board of Education.

ALL BIDS AGAIN REJECTED.

Those for School Property Considered Altogether too Low—Exhibit At Portland.

The board of education last night approved estimates for the coming year, prepared by the finance committee, and ordered the appropriations made to cover them. The schools will cost next year just \$514,000, and of this sum \$398,500 will be needed for maintenance, \$70,000 for the purchase of school sites, \$32,000 towards the payment of bonds, and for a building fund \$13,500.

The resolution presented by the finance committee is as follows:

Resolved, By the board of education of Salt Lake City, that the following is a statement and estimate of the amount necessary for the support and maintenance of the schools under its charge for the school year commencing the first day of July, 1935, and of the amount necessary to pay the interest accruing during said year, and not included in any prior estimate, on bonds issued by this board; and of the amount of sinking fund necessary to be collected during said year for the payment and redemption of said bonds; also an additional amount to be used exclusively for the purchase of school sites and the erection of school buildings during said year, to-wit:

For the support and maintenance of schools \$398,500

For the payment of interest on bonds \$22,500

For sinking fund necessary to be collected \$12,000

For the purchase of school sites and erection of school buildings \$13,500

Total \$514,000

And that the president and the clerk of this board be and are hereby instructed to certify the same to the county commissioners, county clerk, county auditor, county treasurer and county assessor of Salt Lake county.

ALL BIDS REJECTED.

For the second time the set of bids offered for school properties which it is desired to sell, were rejected as being too low. The bids received by the committee on buildings and grounds are as follows: Irving school, S. J. Brown, \$3,000; W. T. Edwards, \$2,750; Thirteenth ward, Badley & Sons, \$2,600 per lot; Longfellow, M. S. Woolley, \$6,250; Anderson Real Estate & Investment company, \$6,450.

The board decided to make a contribution to the state education exhibit at Portland, at a cost not to exceed \$100.

In order to release Miss Josephine Seaman from her contract, it was decided to employ Miss Margaret Hall as a teacher, at \$75.00 per month.

The report of the committee in supplies recommending the purchase of equipment to the value of \$427.84 was adopted.
