HAYES TRAVELS.

SAN FRANCISCO, 16.—A dispatch

from Monterey says: The President

and party arrived in Monterey

about 5 p.m. yesterday and were

escorted to the Hotel Del Norte, where

preparations had been made for

their accommodation. The ball was

given at the hotel in the evening.

The President, Mrs. Hayes, General

Sherman and others of the party

were in attendance, the President,

however, not joining in the dance.

At 10.30 o'clock this morning the

party was escorted into town by the

reception committee. At the inter-

section of Pearl, Alvarado and

California streets where a triangular

triumphal arch was erected. The

Monterey brass band played Hall to

the Chief, the President and party

passing under the arch with unceas-

ing heads. At that point a number

of native Californians on horse-

back joined the procession. Arriv-

ing at Colton, Hayes and party

were greeted with a shower of bou-

quets at the hands of a number of

school children dressed in white,

formed as a living arch on the steps

of the hall above the town.

Captain Brown introduced Pres-

ident Hayes, referring to Monterey,

both ancient and modern, and at-

tributed the sleepiness of the town

to the fact that when General Sher-

man, in 1847, lived in Monterey, he

tried to make a huge punch bowl out

of the Bay. The President then

responded, complimenting the town

and the surrounding scenery. He

then made mention of San Jose,

which place he had passed yes-

terday on his way, saying it was the

handsomest place he had seen since

he had left New Haven and Cleve-

land. Governor Ramsey was intro-

duced and delivered an appropriate

speech. General Sherman, who was

present, was frequently applauded.

He thanked the assembly for the

reception they had given the Pres-

ident. The school children then

sang "Marching Through the Coun-

try." The General joined in the chorus

with spirit. Mrs. Hayes was next

introduced and was heartily cheered

and applauded. The party was re-

ceived in their carriages, passing

through Alvarado, towards the Hotel

Del Norte.

The Presidential party concluded

to remain here until to-morrow

morning at 10 o'clock, at which

hour they leave and proceed direct

to Menlo Park, as guests of Senator

Sharon. The entire party were

driven to Pacific Grove, Point Pin-

point, Carmel Mission and other

places of interest, all express them-

selves highly pleased with their vis-

it. General Sherman will have a

reception this evening at the Hotel

del Monte. He has invited all of

the old pioneers to assemble there,

where he will meet them, and, as he

says, "have a tussle with them."

MORE FROM MAINE.

AUGUSTA, Me., Sept. 16.

General J. A. Garfield, Mentor,

Ohio: Indications now point unmis-

August 16.—Twenty-three addi-

ant, 1,124; Nye, 2, scattering. 12.

The same towns last year Davis had

1,000, Plaisant 386. Davis gains over

all in these towns. There are still

twenty-eight towns and plantations

in Aroostook to be heard from.
