## PEERY BUILDING BURNED.

Destructive Work of Incendiaries—Narrow Escape of Occupants—\$13,000 Damages.

District Court Cases—Weber Stake Academy Notes—Return of Volunteers from Philippines.

A disastrous fire occurred about midnight last night in the Peery building, on the North Side of Twenty-fourth street, between Washington and Grant avenues. The fire is known to have been of incendiary origin, as several months ago three attempts were made in one night to set this building on fire.

The fire last night was first discovered in a pile of boxes placed against the rear wall. The structure was entirely frame and "burned rapidly." The fire spread in the second story and then down to the first. The rear rooms on the second floor were occupied by Mrs. McDermott and her sons, Dave and Fred, and Frank Nangle, were sitting at the table, having just returned from the theatre. They discovered the rear of the building in flames and in an alarm, McDermott ran to the door, and in a moment the three tried to save some valuable papers and other property.

Mrs. McDermott was overcome by the smoke and fainted. The two boys fled to the front window and a ladder, which had been placed there by the fire department and Assistant Chief Hewitt, carried her down to safety. She soon revived after getting into the open air. Fred McDermott and Frank Nangle, but were able to climb down the ladder. Dave received a bad cut on the hand while getting out of the broken window.

Mr. Carnahan's office occupied two of the front rooms, and stairs were completely gutted by fire and drenched with water.

One of the store rooms on the ground floor was occupied as a millinery store by Mrs. Weber. Her stock was damaged by the smoke, fire and water, about two-thirds of it being totally destroyed. She valued her stock at \$4,000 and she carried about \$1,000 insurance.

The other ground floor store was occupied by Van Walter's music store, which contained a stock of pianos and other musical goods. His place was completely flooded with water and the stock ruined. His stock was well insured, but not for the full value.

The losses will aggregate about \$13,000 divided as follows:

Van Walter's, \$5,000  
Weber's, \$4,000  
McDermott's, \$1,000  
Carnahan's, \$1,000  
D. H. Peery, \$1,000

The building was insured and Dr. Carnahan carried \$400 insurance on his library and office fixtures.

The fire had gained good headway when the fire department arrived, but five streams of water were soon playing on it. The department was impeded in its work by live wires and several electrical displays were extinguished while they were raising the ladder to rescue the McDermott family.

A portion of the stock of Mrs. Weber was rescued and removed to a building across the street. The alarm went in at 11:30 and the fire was entirely extinguished by 1 o'clock.

A number of suspects are under the surveillance of the police and arrests may follow.

## COURT NOTES.

Before Judge Rolph in the Second district court, hearing was had in the case of Edward Shuck against his wife, Florence Shuck, wherein a decree of divorce was granted. The charge of desertion. A decree was granted as prayed for.

In the case of Stone vs. Marriott, on motion of defendant the court ordered that the appeal be dismissed with permission to refile on motion.

All jurors on the Mitchell damage case were excused until Tuesday, April 23, 1901.

In the matter of the estate of Oscar Williams, deceased, petition was filed praying for appointment of John Williams as administrator.

**FUNERAL OF A. E. FOULKES.**

The funeral services over the remains of Albert E. Foulkes, the fireman who was killed a few days ago while coupling cars for the Southern Pacific, were held yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the family residence, on 35th street. They were conducted by Rev. Goshen of the Congregational church, who preached a very comforting discourse on the good and noble life of the deceased. The house was not large enough to hold the large number of friends who gathered to pay a tribute of respect to the memory of the estimable young man. The casket was covered with beautiful floral designs. A large cortege followed the remains to the Mountain View cemetery, where they were laid to rest in the family burial ground. The deceased leaves a wife and two children to survive him.


## PAYSON.
