May Day also showed considerable activity though prices were not very firm. The first sale was made at 74, and with the sale of 3,700 shares the stock weakened to 73, but closed a little stronger.

Daily West was stronger today, selling up to \$17.50, while Grand Central was traded in as low as \$5.70.

Ajax sold at 25, Sacramento let go one hundred at 27, and Swansea was active at \$4.00. Valeo was very weak today because of rumors of an assessment. The stock sold at 16, but immediately weakened to 12.

CHEERFUL FROM THE SHOE BRIDGE

Supt. Carruthers Expresses Greatest Confidence that Ore is Close.

THE EL REY ASSESSMENT.

Leveled to Sink the Shaft—The Hatterfield Company—Shawmut Hill—Strike in Uncle Sam.

Within the next few hours it is expected that a body of ore will be exposed on the 225 level of the Shoebridge-Bonanza at Tintic. The latest news from Superintendent Carruthers is very cheerful. Mr. Carruthers says today that the cross-cut is now 65 feet from the shaft, and the formation is so soft that it is necessary to timber right to the face of the drift. The flow of water, which has been quite small heretofore, has increased and every indication makes Mr. Carruthers confident that within the next few hours a remarkable disclosure will be made.

BUTTERFIELD COMPANY.

George W. Keel Cables the Result of the Lawsuit to France.

Manager George W. Keel of the Butterfield Mining company came into town today from Birmingham for the purpose of cabling to Paris the result of the lawsuit between the above company and the Drum Lumber company. He is very much pleased that his company won the case, and looks for a message instructing him to start work on a large and deep mine under the water within the next few days.

The trouble arose from the fact that a vein of ore in the Eagle Bird claim of the Butterfield Mining company crossed the vertical lines of the Drum Lumber property, where Manager Keel tapped it by a lower tunnel. This raised a protest from the Drum Lumber people which led to an incline being run down on the vein from the Eagle Bird shaft. This connected Mr. Keel's shaft with the tunnel workings, and proved that the Butterfield company had the apex to the vein. The other side took the matter to court, however, and the decision rendered yesterday proves the company's right to the apex. Mr. Keel looks for a speedy resumption of work now that the lawsuit is settled.

AT THE UNCLE SAM.

A Large Ore Body Reported to Have Been Encountered.

Eureka, Aug. 2.—Word comes from Knightsville that a new strike has been made in the Uncle Sam mine, one of Jesse Knight's bonanzas on Godiva Hill. It is said to be the largest body of ore yet encountered in the property.

THE EL REY MINE.

The Company Will Shortly Sink the Shaft 200 Feet Deeper.

The directors of the El Rey Mining company have leveled an assessment of five cents per share, which becomes delinquent on August 30th. This will put \$10,000 into the company's treasury and will enable it to pay off outstanding indebtedness and sink the shaft 200 feet deeper. This work will be proceeded with at once, or as soon as the company decides which of the bids now being presented it will accept. The present depth of the shaft is 400 feet, and in sinking it to the 600 level before cross-cutting. This depth will, it is anticipated, interest the vein. The marked improvement in the character of the ore on the 400 level as compared with 200 level, leads the management to believe that good ore will be exposed on the 600 level. The ore on the 400 is all but pay ore. The company will hold the dirt, pump the water out and supply timber for the contractors. At the same time, while power is being used for the contractors a number of men will be put to work cross-cutting on the 400 level.

AT THE SHAWMUT.

Manager Andrew Says the Mill Will Start Up Next Week.

Manager W. B. Andrew of the Shawmut Mining company was in Birmingham yesterday looking over the company's new mill, which is nearly ready to be started up. The finishing touches are now being put on it and it is the intention to start the wheels turning next week. Everything is said to be looking well at the mine. Sinking is still going forward below the 200 level. At the same time prospecting is being carried on in the different levels where two classes of ore are exposed. One is a lead-silver proposition, while the other contains copper, silver and gold. The different classes of ore will be milled together, and Mr. Andrew anticipates no trouble in saving the values from both grades.

ROBERT BELL SPEAKS.

Says the Discovery of Rich Gulches in Idaho is a Strong Probability.

The discovery of another Boise Basin, another Florence, and another Jackson gulch with its 60 ounces of gold to the cubic yard is nearly ready to be leveled to the surface. Idaho's great lava sheets are not only possibilities but strong probabilities, says Robert Bell, the Republican candidate for state mine inspector of Idaho. Some of the richest gold-bearing gravel of California and Ballarat, Australia, were mined from under 200 feet of lava capping. Similar conditions may obtain in Idaho. The proposition offers a wide field for speculation. Idaho placer mining history may not be more than half written.

A thorough geological survey of the State would prove of incalculable benefit to its development and commercial prosperity. The subject would be simple as to variety of rock formations, for with the exception of a very limited area of very recent sediments, they are confined almost entirely to archaic, eruptive and lower Paleozoic series, the great metal bearing series of the world.

This work would establish the relative age of our placer deposits and great lava flows, and prove reliable guide for further development in this line. It would also record some remarkable physical changes in the topography of the State at large. There is conclusive evidence that at one time the Snake river flowed northwest

But Changes in Prices Are Small and Generally Unimportant.

Bonds were steady on a small demand.
