Local and Other Matters.

Thermometer 61 degrees F. in the shade at 1 p.m. to-day. Cloudy.

Ho for Conference.—During Conference time, or definitely from April 5th to 12th, inclusive, tickets from Half Way House to this city and return will be issued by the Great Western Railway Company at a low figure.

Post Mortem.—Dr. P. L. Anderson, who was called in to ascertain the cause of the death of Mrs. Sumner at Saltville, decided that it was "paralytic apoplexy." Mrs. Sumner had experienced two attacks previously. Ogden Junction, March 25.

Bridge over the Weber.—We learn from Capt. Sharp, that the erection of the new U. C. R. R. bridge over the Weber at Ogden will commence to-morrow. The material will arrive at 8 a.m. to-morrow.

Theatre.—This evening the powerful three-act drama of "Old Fidelity" will be presented at the Theatre. Mr. Vinson appearing in his great character of "Old Fidelity." Mrs. Walters, and Messrs. Lindsay and Graham also appearing in prominent parts.

Pedestrianism.—At five minutes to seven o'clock last evening a professional pedestrian named Allen completed the feat, on a wager, of walking, at the Wasatch Hall, a distance of one hundred miles in twenty-four hours. He started at fifteen minutes past eight on Monday evening, accomplishing the feat in twenty-two hours and forty minutes.

Personal.—We were pleased at receiving a call to-day from Mr. J. H. "A Century of Presidents."—We have received from Dwyer's, where it is for sale, at 50 cents, an interesting and instructive little work, giving sketches of the lives of all the Presidents, with a portrait of each, of the United States, from Washington to Grant. It is a volume in paper, having in connection with the matter already mentioned, the Constitution of the United States, with all the amendments.

Waterworks Tested.—Last evening the efficacy of the water works for fire extinguishment purposes underwent a complete test, with a highly satisfactory result. Seven streams from nozzles varying from one inch to one and a half inch played for fifteen minutes, in the vicinity of the Walker House Block, without any apparent diminution of force during that time, the average height being about that of the hotel named. When six of the streams were turned off, the remaining one threw a stream over the flag staff which surrounds the Walker House.

At the City Hall the fire steamer was brought into requisition, in connection with one of the hydrants, and 1,200 feet of hose was attached and stretched along First South Street, and then northward to the vicinity of Col. Winder's residence, and through this extent of hose a stream of water from the nozzle a distance of about 140 feet, and subsequently, without the aid of the fire engine, the stream was turned on, and the water works are an unqualified success.

University of Deseret.—The third term of the present academic year of this institution closed to-day. The school is in a highly prosperous condition, there having been enrolled during the ten weeks, just closed, 178 students, an excess of eleven above the enrollment of last term. The branches of study pursued were Reading and Eloquence, English Grammar, Arithmetic, Geography, Dictation and Punctuation, General History, Civil Government, General History, Rhetoric, Botany, Geology, Analytical Chemistry, Greek and Virgil.

The library connected with the University has been also increasing in patronage, there having been 1,312 volumes given out during the last term of ten weeks.

A Heavy Task.—The removal of the stock of Z. C. M. I. to the new building is something of a Herculean task, there being a continuous arrival of goods and departure of empty wagons from the receiving entrance day after day, and yet the removal is far from being complete; notwithstanding it is calculated the opening for business will take place on Saturday.

Nineteenth Ward.—On Friday evening the last one for the season of the popular Sunday School Socials takes place. On the occasion a goodly array of talent will appear, the names being given of the Misses Annie Parks, Laura Nebeker, S. E. Mousley, M. Carrington, Lizzie Davis, Settie Margetts, John C. Graham, H. E. Downing, Emmet Mousley, Eli A. Tolland, Rodney C. Badger, &c.

Unconstitutional.—The Federal election law, decided, the other day, by the U. S. Supreme Court, to be unconstitutional, and therefore void, is the same law under which the unconstitutionally inclined ring of this city sought to shield themselves a year ago last August, when they created such disastrous disturbances during the election at that time, winding off with an attempt to obtain possession by force, of the ballot box at the City Hall. Like many other rotten props upon which they have leaned, it has been knocked from under them. [The Court of last resort is the best; safeguard of human liberty in the Republic, for, while political corruption runs riot in the land, that institution appears to maintain its integrity as a bulwark of the rights of man. Long may it keep a position so honorable and exalted, and be a check upon the doings of those who seek to trample upon the constitutional privileges of the people.]

City Council.—The Council met last evening, Mayor Little presiding.

Petition of E. D. Hoge, Geo. DeFord and thirty-two others, asking that South Temple Street, east of the Du Roll residence, be graded and placed under proper repair; referred to committee on streets and alleys.

Petition of Eliza Salisbury, relict of the late William Salisbury, asking that her city taxes be remitted; granted.

Petition of A. Neibaur, for remission of city taxes; laid over, to come up in its order.

Petition of John Hepworth for the use of a portion of the street and sidewalk in front of his premises, east side of East Temple Street, on which to pile building material for four months; granted twenty feet of the street and the inner ten feet of the sidewalk, the width of the premises. On the verbal petition of Councillor Dinwiddie, himself, Mayor Little, W. Jennings and H. W. Lawrence were each granted a similar privilege, in front of their respective premises, on First South Street.

Petition of Joseph A. Morris and others, residents of the 10th and 10th Wards, asking for the removal, from the former ward, of Mr. W. Jennings' slaughter house; referred to the Marshal.

On motion of Alderman Pyper, the committee on municipal laws were instructed to, forthwith, draft an ordinance regulating the terms of the distribution, &c., of water in buildings.

Bill of J. L. Rawlings, city attorney, for legal services from Feb. 25 to March 25th, \$100.00, amount appropriated and the salary of the attorney fixed at \$2,000 per annum, payable monthly.

Bill of Davis, How & Co., for material supplied the waterworks, \$2,000. Also, bill of the Boston Machine Company, for waterworks material, \$320.63; received and amounts appropriated.

Adjourned till next Tuesday, at 7 p.m.
