appears that the chief point in It appears that the chief point in contention between the company and the strikers is the latter's damand for the discharge of 40 German engineers. The company is a German concern and hence refuses to comply with the de-mand of the strikers. In view of possi-ble disturbances on Saturday and Sun-day the gas complications are adding greatly to the danger of the situation.

Strikers Drive Out Officials.

Warsaw, March 2.-Strikers today rove the officials and clerks from the offices of the gas company and thence marched to the gas works, which are occupied by the military. The strikers merely jeered at the soldiers, shouting:

SITUATION DISCOURAGING St. Petersburg, March 2,-Black clouds are again lowering over the industrial situation of Russia. The strike at Moscow has been resumed on a large scale, anarchy reigns in the Caucasus, and at St. Petersburg the Caucasus, and at SL Petersburg the measures which the government ad-vanced to quiet discontent and restore good relations between masters and men appear to have failed, with the probability of causing the storm to break anew. The labor delegates representing the The labor delegates representing the whole of the industrial population of St. Petersburg and who were elected to choose 50 members of the Schidlovski reconciliation commission, met again yesterday and reaffirmed the resolution adopted the previous day, which threatened, in case the demands are not granted, not only to refuse to elect labor representatives to the commis-sion, but to order a resumption of the general strike. labor representatives to the commu-sion, but to order a resumption of the general strike. These demands are for the release of imprisoned workmen; freedom from arrest; unhampered speech; full pub-licity of meetings of the commission, and the abolition of the censorship. A practical ultimatum was delivered calling for an answer today. There is little expectation that the government will grant the conditions demanded. The strike already has assumed large proportions here, about 50,000 men be-ing out. Among those who saruck yes-terday are the employees of the St. Petersburg shops of the Waffsaw rail-rond. The strike has not yet extended to the trainmen, but the leaders may decide to order them out in order to paralyze one of the most important railroads in Russia.

RUSSIAN DISSENTERS.

Vexatious Regulations Against Them to be Repealed.

Them to be Repealed. St. Petersburg, March 1.-The com-mittee of ministers, after discussing the status of religious dissenters and con-sidering measures to remove the griev-ance of that class, has decided in favor of repealing all regulations of a vexitious character proposed by the minister of the interior within three months, and to order the abolition of all measures interfering, with religious belief except such as may be considered indispensable, which should receive the sanction of the emperor. The committee of ministers has de-cided to direct the minister of the in-terior to forbid the enforcement of regulations dealing with protection, or statute or police surveillance of religious matters. The committee of ministers also calls

matters. The committee of ministers also calls upon the heads of ministerial departments and the procurator-general of the holy synod to present reports to the empeor, and requests that all sentences of exile and imprisonment for religious errors should be quashed.

Nebraska Anti-Trust Bill.

Nebraska Anti-trust Bill. Lincoln, Neb., March 2.-The house to-day passed the anti-trust bill by a vote of 72 to 10. It has still to be considered by the senate. The bill exempts domest-corporations in its provisions, and its au-thor. Representative Junkins, said that, while it affected all foreign public cor-porations, it was almed specifically at the so-called beet trust and the Standard Oil company. Fublicity by the medium of complete reports to the attorney-general and severe penalities for violation of the anti-rebate provisions are leading fea-tures of the bill.

McKowen's Shortage.

Sacramento, March 2.-After an extend-ed debate the senate today refused to re-consider the report of the committee which investigated the defalcation of former Sacy. McKowen and the financial system employed at the state university. The report was denied adoption last Tues-day and today the vote on reconsideration was lost by 14 ayes to 18 nees.

Mexican Sugar Refinery.

Mexico City, March 2.-The Mexican National Sugar Refining company, incor-porated under the laws of New Jersey, filed papers here today. The company is capitalized at \$1,000,000 (goft) and pro-poses to erect a modern sugar refinery at Vera Cruz. Vera Cruz.
