Cutting Rates on the Chicago and

Missouri River Roads.

CHICAGO, Feb. 4.—The war in freight

rates instituted by the Chicago, Mil-

waukee & St. Paul Railroad is the one

classes of freight to Missouri River

points today and followed it up later

by an additional cut of one cent on first-

class and three cents on second. This

further cut was made by the South-

western & North Pacific, and the

Omaha and Council Bluffs are con-
