

## LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**THEATRICAL.**—"East Lynne" was played in good style last night, although much of its force was destroyed by the omission of several important scenes or portions of scenes, which properly belong to the piece. Kate Denin's dual personation of "Lady Isabel" and "Madame Vine" was a truly fine piece of acting. She delineated the characters to perfection. Mr. Wilson, whether from indisposition or some other cause, did not impart to his "Archibald Carlyle" that degree of spirit and pathos which properly belongs to the character. Mr. Lindsay makes an admirable "Levison," Mrs. DeBar is quite at home as "Miss Corney Carlyle." Messrs. Thorne and Mackintosh did very well as "Lord Mount Severn" and "Richard Hare."

"Slasher and Crasher" received full justice from Messrs. Graham and Margetta, Mrs. DeBar, Mr. Lindsay and Mrs. Clawson.

To-night, Mr. Hardie, who has long been favorably known by the play-going public of this city as an artist of considerable promise, takes a benefit prior to his departure for the East. The pieces selected are "Forrest's five act play of 'Jack Cade,'" and the humorous extravaganza of "Jenny Lind at last," in the former of which Mr. Hardie sustains the character of "Jack Cade," Kate Denin that of "Marianne," Mr. McKenzie "Lacy," a friar, with Messrs. Lindsay, Graham, Margetta, Thorne and the other ladies and gentlemen of the corps in the numerous other characters of the piece. The cast in the afterpiece will be as formerly.

**THE UTAH CENTRAL.**—We learn that seven car loads of iron have reached Farmington, and five more are expected there today. Tracklaying, however, will not recommence until enough iron is on hand to finish the road as far as Bountiful, when active operations will at once become the order of the day.

**GOOD NEWS FROM BOX ELDER.**—Our esteemed correspondent, A. C., writing from Brigham City on the 13th instant, says:

"A few days since President L. Snow, Counselor L. Smith and Bishop Nichols located a place for the erection of a woolen factory on the Box Elder, about one-sixth of a mile above the old grist mill. Its dimensions are to be 35 by 95 feet; it will be two stories high, one built of rock, the other of adobe. Our lumbermen, carpenters and rock-haulers are engaging for extensive work during the winter. It is to be conducted on the principle of co-operation, as also is the tannery which is now finished and supplying the market with leather.

The stockholders of the Co-operative Mercantile Institution (one hundred in number) had a pleasant meeting last Tuesday, it being the fourth anniversary of its existence. The reports were very favorable; the capital stock now amounts to \$35,000.

The people here have been uncommonly busy this season and have made many substantial improvements. Union and fine feeling seem to be prevalent, and no attention or thought is bestowed upon schisms or isms; they are beneath our notice. As recreations we have performances at our theatre and interesting social parties."

**LECTURE.**—The first lecture of the season, under the auspices of President Joseph Young, was delivered at the Seventies' Hall, last evening to a select audience, who gathered by invitation. The lecturer was Elder H. W. Naisbitt, and his subject was a review of the censorship of the press and of places of amusement, as exercised in Britain, France and other parts of the world, contrasted with the liberty—so often degenerating into unbridled license—given to the newspaper and theatrical world in this nation. Presidents Joseph and Brigham Young made instructive remarks after the lecture.

The re-union was an exceedingly interesting one, the pleasures of which were much enhanced by the sweet singing of the Twentieth Ward Choir. We look forward to many pleasurable and instructive meetings in the Seventies' Hall this winter before the series is through.

**LONG ISLAND.**—Through a letter from Elder F. A. Hammond, dated Patchogue, Long Island, where he is at present staying, we learn that he is actively engaged in spreading the truths of the gospel to the benighted in those parts. Though meeting with much prejudice and ignorance regarding the great Latter-day work, he believes he is doing good, and had the privilege a few days before he wrote of addressing a large congregation in that place. The doctrine of plurality of wives is the subject par excellence, that the folks wish to hear about, but are indifferent to all other principles of the gospel.

**FROM THE GREAT SALT LAKE TO THE COLUMBIA.**—The Omaha Herald in its editorial of the 12th inst. makes the following allusions to the enterprise lately brought before Congress, of a telegraphic line from the Great Salt Lake to the Columbia River, Oregon:

"Senator Williams of Oregon has introduced a bill to aid in the construction of a telegraphic line from some point on the Columbia River to the Great Salt Lake."

This is a movement which is undoubtedly intended as a forerunner of the Puget's Sound branch of the Union Pacific Railroad as surveyed and advocated by General G. M. Dodge, chief engineer of the national highway. It should receive the undivided support of the Central States of the West as among the most important enterprises which has ever been brought to the attention of Congress."
