FROM THE GREAT SALT LAKE TO THE COLUMBIA. - The Quaha Herold in its editorial of the 12th inst. makes the following allusions to the enterprise lately brought before Congress, of a telegraphic line from the Great Salt Lake to the Columbia River. Oregon:

"Senator Williams of Oregon has intro-duced a bill to aid in the construction of a telegraph line from some point on the Col-umbia River to the Great Salt Lake.

This is a movement which is undoubtedly intended as a forerunner of the Puget's Sound branch of the Union Pacific Railroad as surveyed and advocated by General G. M. Dodge, chief engineer of the national highway. It should receive the undivided support of the Central States of the West as among the most important enterprises which has ever been brought to the attention of Congress."
