HEAVY DRIVES -AT AM. SMELTING

Was Feature of Trading and Went 43-8 Under Last Night's Closing.

STOCKS GENERALLY DOWN

During Day Almost Entire List Scored Declines-Close Dull And Week.

New York, Sept. 3 .- The downward

course of prices in progress when the stock market closed yesterday was extended at the opening today. American Smelting was a feature and broke an extreme 24 points on sales of 4,000 shares at 94 and 95. Other metal and mining stocks were affected in sympathy, National Lead declining 1% Amalgamated Copper, Anaconda and Republic Steel preferred 1. The market showed an inclination for a time to cut loose from the depressing influence of the metal stocks, and Reading and the general western group accordingly railied sharply from the opening figures. A later drive against American Smelting drove it down over 4 points. Salt Lake Organization Urges That Each County Develop a Club.

BIG AREA OF FLOOR SPACE

It Will Be Set Apart in the New Building for Use of County Exhibits of Products.

Utah, with a minimum of at least a Commercial club for the principal city of every county, is a condition which the Salt Lake Commercial club is to

A commercial club for every town in

the Salt Lake Commercial club is to attempt to create by an immediate state campaign.

The campaign will be carried forward through the winter, and the immediate object in view is to have every county in the state prepared to take floor space in the new Commercial club home in which to maintain and operhome, in which to maintain and oper-ate and exhibit of county resources and

products.

"There will be in the new home," declared Fisher Harris today, "a whole floor of 7,000 feet of floor space, to be dedicated solely to the exhibition of Utah's resources. This means that every county can have a good exhibit, if the county will maintain it, and each county is to be invited so to do. LEAGUE OF CLUBS.

"Other reasons than this demand that a league of clubs be created. We receive for instance, almost daily letters of inquiry about some specific part of the state or some specific product. Could we refer these letters to the Commercial clubs in the districts affected the answers would be more

Commercial clubs in the districts affected, the answers would be more complete than what we can now give, although we use the best means at our service to answer all inquiries.

"For all these reasons it is urgently important that in every county there be at least one commercial club. Every town that hasn't one should set about to get one. Some of the towns already have such organizations in excellent shape. At Eureka, for instance, they are about to erect a splendid building. shape. At Eureka, for instance, they are about to erect a splendid building, and what Brigham City and Provo clubs have done for their communities, we all know. Who, for instance, in Salt Lake does not know from going to Provo for Strawberry day, or to attend the horse races, that Provo bench land needs settlers, and that the fruit belt is capable of great expansion and development?"

UNIVERSAL STATIONERY. The Commercial club plan is to have the league all use the same "booster" material, and to be affiliated in some way. An interchange of courtesies may not be wholly practicable in all places, as so many residents of outside towns spend a great deal of their time in Salt Lake, and should they give up their membership here, to come in on an exchange of courtesy system, the Salt Lake club's membership list would be seriously lessened in size just at a time when every member's interest is

time when every member's interest is needed to successfully launch the important work immediately ahead.

The board of governors of the Salt Lake club will-consider in the very near future the matter of writing to each Commercial club now organized, and to the city officials of towns where they should be organized, urging the fermation of new clubs and a convention in Salt Lake to form a state learne.
