AT LOGGERHEADS,

Labor Leaders Disagree Over Indorsing Miners' Strike.

Lynn, Mass., Oct. 13.-At today's session of the state branch of the Am-erican Federation of Labor a resolu-tion endorsing the strike of the West-ern Federation of Miners and pledg-ing the moral and financial support of the Massachusetts organization brought out a spirited debate. The newly elected third vice-presi-dent, Edward Cohen, attacked the min-ers' organization, claiming that it was the foundation of the American Labor union, whose sole object was to eradiunion, whose sole object was to eradi-cate the American Federation of Labor, and for this convention to give its moral and financial support was to place in the hands of the miners a club

to be used against the American Fed-eration of Labor. A substitute resolution providing that the convention enter a protest agains the methods of the Colorado authorities against the miners and ex-pressing the hope that the trades unonists would be triumphant in Colorado was adopted.

FAIRBANKS' TRIP OVER. He Traveled 6,396 Miles and Made 111 Speeches.

Chicago, Oct. 13 .- Senator Fairbanks returned to Chicago this evening from his campaign tour to the Pacific coast. He came in over the Rock Island road on the special train on which he

They Have Broken Up a System.
