

JAP STRIKERS PICKET HONOLULU

Those Not Connected With or in
Sympathy With Movement Not
Permitted in Their Camp.

TWO OF LEADERS ARRESTED.

Charged With Kidnaping a Strike-
breaker—His Case Tried by Cer-
tain Japanese Officials.

Honolulu, July 5.—Considerable excitement was created today by the arrest of two more of the leaders of the Japanese plantation laborers who were on strike, for the alleged false imprisonment of T. Sunoda, a Japanese employed on the Weipahu plantation on a profit sharing basis. Following the arrests an investigation was set in motion which disclosed the fact that the 2,500 Japanese still on strike have picketed the portion of the city about their quarters and prevent any person not connected or in sympathy with the movement from entering the camp of the strikers. The charge on which the arrests were made was that strikebreakers had been kidnaped. Sunoda was seized yesterday in the vicinity of the strikers' camp and alleged that his captors took him to a room in a Japanese hotel, where he was kept by force while his case was put on trial before certain officials of the Weipahu branch of the Japanese Higher Wage association. At the time of his capture Sunoda declared that he was seeking to secure the services of several Japanese laborers, to help him in carrying out the contract he has on a section of the Weipahu plantation. He told the police that he believed his life would have been in danger if the police had not interrupted the trial of his case which his fellow countrymen were conducting.

The attitude taken by the Japanese consul and Admiral Hiei of the Japanese training squadron, now in the harbor, is believed here to eliminate any possibility of international complications.

President, Rev. Anna H. Shaw, Moylan, Pa.; first vice president, Mrs. Rachel Foster Avery, Swarthmore, Pa.; second vice president, Mrs. Florence Kelley, New York; corresponding secretary, Miss Kate M. Gordon, New Orleans; recording secretary, Mrs. Ella S. Stewart, Chicago; treasurer, Mrs. Harriet Taylor Upton, Warren, O.; first auditor, Miss Laura Clay, Lexington, Ky.; second auditor, Miss Alice Stone Blackwell, Boston.

Secy. Gordon accepted re-election unwillingly, with the understanding that she might resign after a few months. The national leaders hope that Prof. Frances Squire Potter may be induced to leave the University of Minnesota and give all her time to the office of corresponding secretary at the New York headquarters to be established, succeeding Miss Gordon, who will give all her time to the Louisiana State association.

The question of the next convention city was left to the general officers for decision. The candidates were Sioux Falls, S. D., and Washington, D. C. The general officers had recommended Washington to the convention, but when the choice was made the financial inducements offered by the Sioux Falls business men had not been submitted. In the convention, the argument that to hold the national convention in Sioux Falls just before election would swing South Dakota into the suffrage column was very effective. The matter did not come to a vote, however, a motion to refer to the general officers prevailing.

REMARKABLE ESCAPE OF BOY CAUGHT UP BY BALLOON

Santa Cruz, Cal., July 5.—In the presence of 20,000 people gathered on the beach to celebrate the Fourth, Jesse Wyman, a 10-year-old boy, was caught in the ropes of a balloon during an ascension this afternoon and carried head downward 500 feet in the air. Scores of women, including the boy's mother, fainted as they saw the little fellow carried away.

Jesse had been standing very close to the balloon and, as it shot upward, a trailing rope from the parachute became entangled around his legs. The horrified crowd expected to see him dashed to the ground, but the rope seemed to be securely fastened about the little fellow's legs and he soon managed to get an upright position. As the balloon drifted out over the ocean, Virgil Moore, the aeronaut, drew the boy up to him and held him close to his side on the trapez bar. After drifting out over the water for a third of a mile, a gust of wind blew the balloon on its side and it slowly descended to the water as the gases escaped.

A launch from the naval training ship Albatross followed the balloon, and dashed up as the aeronaut and the boy touched the water. Aside from a bad fright the boy was none the worse for his thrilling experience.

Celebrates Two Hundred and Fiftieth Anniversary of its Founding.

Norwich, Conn., July 5.—With the changing of bells and booming of guns the celebration of the two hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the settlement of the town was ushered in today. The program of the day opened early with a flight of the airship "The California Arrow," by Capt. Thomas S. Baldwin from the Country club grounds.

At 10 o'clock President Taft and his party, including Capt. Butt, his military aide, and Asst. Secy. Mishler, arrived on a special train from Boston as the guests of the committee of amusements.

As the president appeared a battery on Geers Hill fired the salute of 21 guns.

FOURTH OF JULY CASUALTIES IN PITTSBURG

Pittsburg, July 5.—The total fire loss, according to the underwriters of Pittsburg, due to the independence day celebration, is estimated today at \$20,000. This does not include losses less than \$100.

The death list from accidents by exploding fire works remains at one. An infant was killed while the mother was watching a pyrotechnical display at Schenley park. A sky-rocket struck the baby on the head, crushing its skull. The baby died 10 minutes later.

The list of injured in and about Pittsburg will total close to 300. Of this number there may be several deaths.

All previous records in the number of persons hauled by the street railway company were broken yesterday. It was estimated by the Pittsburg Railway company, that 1,500,000 fares were collected during the 24 hours beginning at midnight Sunday and ending Monday at the same hour. This represents close to \$50,000.

The hair-raising impromptu feat of an iron worker who climbed out on the narrow thread cable today swung 300 feet high between the Frick building and the courthouse tower when the largest flag in the world refused to unfurl, caused a small panic among the hundreds of watchers below. As the iron worker slid and swung out and over the street in his effort to break the flag to the wind, several women fainted and the jammed streets became a place of terror for the weaker ones in the crowd.

It is estimated that close to \$100,000 was spent by fond parents and relatives for the young American of Greater Pittsburg yesterday.

Nashville, Tenn., July 5.—In a statement published today, Atty. Gen. Caldwell, who prosecuted and con-

victed the night riders at Union City, Tenn., several months ago, and whose cases were reversed by the supreme court last Saturday, scores the members of that tribunal for their decision. Among other things, Gen. Caldwell says:

"I may be wrong, but in my opinion these three judges have committed a judicial blunder such as has not occurred for a hundred years in Tennessee's jurisprudence. Of course, I accord them honesty and sincerity, but the God of justice pities their judgment."

"None of those who are in a position to know can realize the full meaning of the decision. According to it, I see no way to ever have a trial of the case again. Retributive justice must be left to an avenging God."

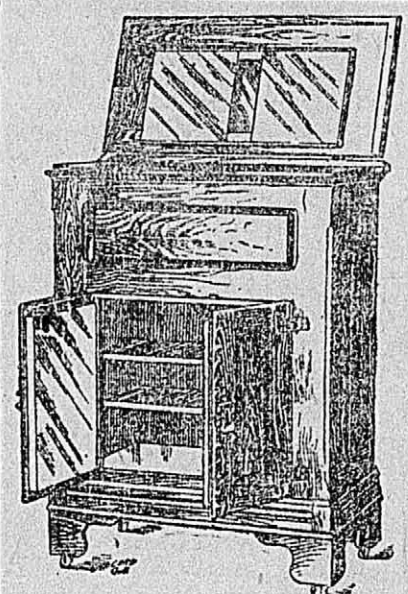

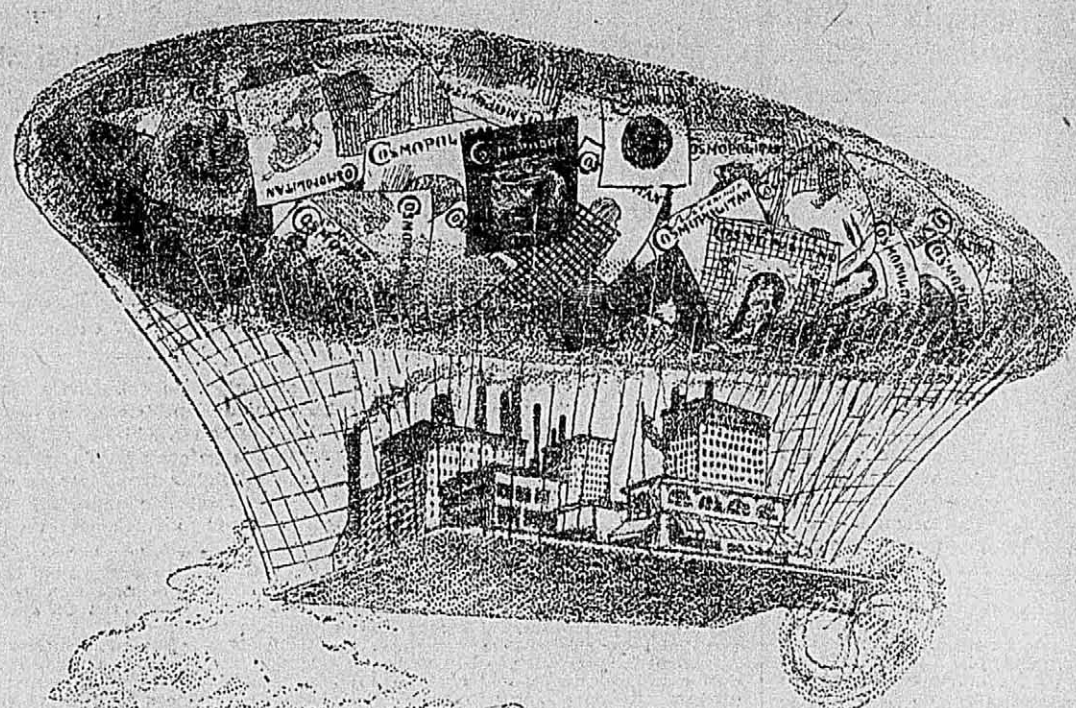
