CASUALTIES IN PITTSBURG Fittsburg, July 6.—The total fire loss, according to the underwriters of Pitts-burg, due to the Independence day cele-The death list from accidents by ex-

Following the arrests an investigation was set in motion which disclosed the fact that the 2,500 Japanese still on strike have picketed the portion of the city about their quarters and prevent any person not connected or in sympathy with the movement from entering the camp of the strikers. The charge on which the arrests were made was that strikebreakers had been kidnaped Sunoda was seized yesterday in the vicinity of the strikers' camp and al-leges that his captors took him to a room in a Japanese hotel, where he was kept by force while his case was put on trial before certain officials of the Weipahu branch of the Japan-ese Higher Wage association. At the time of his capture Sunda declares that he was seeking to secure the services of several Japanese laborer; to help him in carrying out the con-tract he has on a section of the Wei-pahu plantation. He told the police that he believed his life would have been in danger if the police had no-interrupted the trial of his case which his fellow countrymen were conduct-ing.
