COLLAPSE OF THE
BIG ALBANY STORE

Former Employee of the Institution
Talks of Yesterday's Frightful
Accident.

IN SALT LAKE FOR BRIEF STAY

Concerned Catered to Finest Class of
Trade in the New York Capital—
Employed Many Persons.

Regarding the terrible collapse of the John G. Myers department store at Albany yesterday, Chester M. Rhodes, formerly employed in the firm, and who is in Salt Lake for a day or two en route to the east, made the following statement to the "News" this morning:

"The store is situated on North Pearl street and runs through the block to James street. James street is down the hill from Pearl and about two stories lower than the Pearl street front. Under the main floor on the slope of the hill there was a series of basements and cellars for storage purposes and for boiler rooms. It was in these improvements were being made which caused the accident.

"The building when I last saw it was still supported with wooden beams on cast iron pillars. The purpose of the improvement was to make more storage room and the basements were being enlarged. From the account of the accident I see that Mr. Fitzgerald was among the killed. He is one of the oldest employees of the store and was one of the first to enter the firm's employ when it was organized. His department was situated in about the middle of the store and accordingly work must have progressed about half way between James and Pearl streets.

"The account has Robert M. Clement as one of the injured, and as a member of the firm. The name is unfamiliar to me, and I am under the impression that he is given the wrong name. I think Robert M. Clement is a recent hiree of the firm, and he has been admitted in the corporation.

"The store is one that caters to the finest trade in Albany and employed a great number of clerks, mostly girls. The scenes about the accident must have been most terrible, and I am confident that any part of the building could easily render the entire structure unsafe from its old style of construction."

MADE BIG TO DECEIVE.

Shown in Case of Shepard Who Was Bound Over to Grand Jury.

R. B. Shepard, the well known proprietor of "Ye Olde Book Shoppe," was yesterday bound over to the grand jury by United States Commissioner Baldwin to answer to the charge of larceny in law, obscene and lascivious reading matter in the United States mails, contrary to the United States postal laws. The bonds were fixed at \$500 which Mr. Shepard furnished.

The United States district attorney presented the case for the government. The evidence produced in court showed that letters advertising this sort of literature were sent through the United States mails by Mr. Shepard and bore his signature. A number of publications in which the defendant is alleged to have dealt were also presented in the case. These books, which were in production, which is in conflict with the laws governing the mails, weighing less than a pound, is said to have been shipped by freight in a box containing a shipment of 50 pounds in order to deceive the authorities. The defendant introduced no evidence and the case was submitted without argument. Mr. Shepard is represented by S. P. Arnold.

AUTUMN REMINDERS.

Reference Made to Approach of Fall in Weekly Crop Report.

Weekly Crop Bulletin for the week ending Monday, Aug. 7.—Seasonal temperatures were enjoyed throughout the entire week, with comparatively warm days, and cool, bracing nights, conveying suggestions of fall in not a few instances. More or less precipitation fell everywhere, though the amount was insufficient for all needs, except where the southern portion of the state, where thunder showers were numerous and heavy, causing some delay in the hay fields and damaging some of the crops. The middle and northern portions of the state had been without rain so long, and the amount this past week being so small, the thirty soil drank up the moisture very rapidly, and left the crops in sore need of more. However, the weather favored having and harvesting, and while the hay was being rapidly taken care of the grain crops were slowly ripening, and in many valleys demanding the harvesters. All reports indicate wheat, oats, rye and barley doing well, with some few exceptions. The second crop of lucerne was light, but native hay was about average. Sugar beets continued fairly good, despite the local depredations of flies and bugs. Garden truck of good quality was steadily pouring in to the city markets, and fall fruit was beginning to appear in many orchards. Apples were in the proportion, though apples were a close second. The latter fruit, however, was not of the best quality. The range was revived throughout the southern portion by the rains of the week, but generally over the state feed was poor, except high up in the hills along the streams, where the burning sun has not withered the grass. Despite the decrease of range feed, stock generally were in fairly good condition, holding out as well as usual. In obedience to
