

pany of American, French and Russian capitalists, capital 25,000,000 roubles for the erection of American grain elevators throughout the empire.

Madrid, 26.—Counsel have examined the claims of American citizens for losses incurred during the Cuban revolution. No decision has been arrived at.

Alexanderis, 26.—Cholera reappeared in Fayroom on the west side of the Nile and at Zipteh.

London, 26.—Copeman and four others crossed the Channel, from Dover to Calais, in his seat raft in six hours.

The arbitrators decide that the South Staffordshire colliers are not entitled to an advance in wages.

Irish informers, Michael Kavanagh, Joseph Smith and Joseph Haulon have arrived at Calcutta. They were shipped as grooms on a steamer which took horses from Melbourne to the former port.

Paris, 26.—It is believed in the lobbies of the Chambers, that the Minister of Finance, Teriad, will resign. It is also reported that Prime Minister Ferry is pressing Leon Say for the place, but the latter declines.

Rome, 26.—It is stated that the Pope will declare the Pantheon a Pagan temple if a monument to Victor Emanuel is erected in its centre, as intended by King Humbert.

LONDON, 27.—Cholera has reappeared at Cairo. Since this second visitation at Alexandria twenty-five cases are reported.

Alexandria, 27.—The reappearance of cholera causes a panic. Passengers from European ports have returned without landing.

Paris, 27.—The conference for the protection of the sub-marine cable is concluded. The most important feature of the conference was the English proposal that in the event of war, any power should be at liberty to withdraw its right of remission when peace had been concluded, and the conference adopted this principle. This means that in case of war any power may cut the cable at its own risk and peril, and the cables must take the chances the same as other property.

LONDON, 27.—Mary Anderson appeared to-night in the "Lady of Lyons" before a crowded, enthusiastic house. She was recalled several times, and renewed the success she achieved in "Ingomar." The Prince of Wales witnessed the performance.

The cable convention will apply outside of territorial waters to all submarine cables legally laid which touch land in territories of contracting parties. The latter bind themselves when authorizing the landing of cables to impose conditions for their protection, in laying or repairing; ships must observe rules to avoid foulings. The tribunals competent to deal with infractions, the convention decides to be those of the country to which the ship in fault belongs. Ratifications will be exchanged at Paris within a year. Other States may join the convention on making application.

Madrid, 27.—The circles of the battalion guarding the Ministerial buildings were suddenly replaced to-day and subsequently disarmed. The battalion is suspected of revolutionary principles.

BELFAST, 28.—There is every reason to fear a conflict will take place at Bollic, County Fermanagh. The Nationalists have given out their intention to hold a meeting at that place. It will be very difficult for the military and police to keep the Orangemen back as they did at the recent meeting at Roslea. Two thousand Orangemen have been armed with revolvers, and the Nationalists have made no preparation for protection.

The Secretary of the Steamship Owners Association has written a letter to Earl Granville, British Foreign Secretary, urging that fresh action be taken with the concurrence of the Association, looking to the cutting of a second canal across the Isthmus of Suez.

Paris, 28.—The Temps says: It is rumored that King Luis of Portugal, being weary of the liberal agitation in the kingdom, thinks of abdicating.

Alexandria, 28.—There were 12 cholera deaths on Saturday.

The deaths from cholera are averaging 8 to 10 daily. The deaths are chiefly among Europeans. Private advices announce that seven cases have appeared in the interior.

Smyrna, 28.—Another shock of earthquake was experienced to-day, damaging the wall surrounding the town and the aqueduct. In the mosque at Vourla, 169 persons were seriously or slightly injured; 96 are in the hospital.

Hamilton, Bermuda, 28.—A sharp shock of earthquake occurred the afternoon of the 20th. The oscillation was continued fully 20 seconds. The shock was felt throughout Bermuda. Damage slight.

Berlin, 28.—Gen. Steinhmann, the officer commanding the troops at Oldenburg, who is a Prussian and only recently appointed to that post, has made himself very unpopular. He grossly insulted the soldiers and people of Oldenburg, whereupon he received a challenge from an Oldenburg officer. The men met and the challenger was seriously wounded. Gen. Steinhmann's house was afterward attacked and partly demolished by the mob, which had to be dispersed by a force of soldiers. Martial law will be proclaimed at Oldenburg.

LONDON, 29.—The Chinese legation furnished the newspapers copies of the entire correspondence with the French Minister on Foreign Affairs upon the Tonquin question. The correspondences embraces 27 communications.

DUBLIN, 29.—There was no public meeting of the National League any where in Ireland yesterday, the government forbidding them. Some disorders occurred at Castle Lyon, County Cork, where the police with fixed bayonets charged upon a procession, breaking it up completely and capturing the banners and musical instruments. When the military and police withdrew, however, a meeting was held, and thus the object of the League was effected.

London, 29.—Despite the disapproval of Derby, colonial minister of exploration, the New Guinea projectors will proceed by steamer leaving England before Christmas, and will take six months provisions, tents, arms. Each subscriber of a hundred pounds to the expedition will secure a land warrant entitling him to a thousand acres.

It is reported that Gladstone goes to Cannes.

A gentleman was attacked yesterday by a lunatic in a car of the Suburban Railway and beaten insensibly. The only other occupant of the compartment was a lady. When the train arrived at the station she gave the alarm and the lunatic was secured.

The fisheries commission award Canada 27 gold and silver medals.

Vienna, 29.—The government of Greece protests against the action of the Turkish government in refusing to allow a Grecian man-of-war to land supplies at Chios for the sufferers by the earthquake at that place.

Cairo, 29.—One hundred and fifty Egyptian soldiers were surprised and massacred by the hill tribes in Sineat Desfile, Nubia.

#### A GIRL'S SAD DEATH.

Miss Lizzie Belle, daughter of Benjamin F. and Clara A. Stevens, died in Livermore Centre, Me., Sept. 27th, under peculiar circumstances. Her age was 13 years and 9 months. Her parents sent the Lewiston Journal this strange story of her death:

"Lizzie was employed in the box factory at Richmond's Mill, covering the little boxes turned there. One morning a basket of boxes was turned upon her bench. She put her hands in them to sift the sawdust from them, and discovered something among them, which she took hold of and brought to light. To her great horror it was a very large spotted snake. She was speechless for a while, but at length revived and said to the boss of the mill, 'that awful big snake.' He said it made him shudder to touch it. She kept about for several weeks after with the horror of that dreadful snake ever before her. She would go to bed nights but could not sleep or even remain in her bed; for that dreadful snake was ever around her. She kept up as long as she could and then took her bed. The first week she seemed comfortable; then she was taken crazy. Her chief talk was the snake. It seemed over in her bed or around her. She did not even recognize her father or mother, and her sufferings were heartrending. She lay in this state 10 weeks, and then was stricken with typhoid fever, which ran three weeks. The last few days her senses returned in a measure. Up to the time the fever set in, the doctor called it no disease, simply nervous prostration. We think that her sickness, suffering and death all started from that terrible shock."

#### A SPITEFUL FLING.

At Hebron, Conn., lately a clergyman raised trouble in his church by some straightforward talk in the pulpit. It seems that one of the leading members, a man of large wealth, has been married four times, having been divorced in two cases. His third wife is a member of the same church, and his fourth, before he could marry her, was compelled to secure a legal separation from her husband. This man's voice was frequently heard in prayer meeting, a circumstance which naturally angered the clergyman. Finally he could endure the travesty of religion no longer, so he preached a sermon giving a spirited sketch of a whitened sepulchre, whom every one recognized as the much-married Pharisee. The latter was so wroth at what he called a personal onslaught upon himself that he has brought suit for \$5,000 for defamation of character.

The San Francisco Chronicle in its customary unfair, splenetic and dishonest style says:

Peace-makers in the church are trying to placate the Connecticut Mormon, because he is a heavy contributor to the current expenses, but the clergyman will make no apology for telling the truth.

The statement that the obnoxious disruptor of other people's families is a "Mormon" is not only a self evident and spiteful falsehood, but the fling is childish, senseless and flabby. The outspoken clergyman is not a "Mormon," but it was he who acted the more like one. A little of the truthful disposition of the Connecticut minister would be of service to the Chronicle.
