A LONG SUSPENSION.

Kirman Norton "Laid Off" by the Commissioner of the Interior—The Interior Trial Continued.

The board of fire and police commissioners met last night and on account of the absence of important witnesses for the prosecution postponed the trial of Kirman Norton, McMillan, and several others until 9 o'clock this evening.

Regarding the case of Kirman Norton, accused of drunkenness, the board reported that the charges were sustained and that "as a punishment for this offense, we order that you be suspended from the date of your discharge on this charge until October 1st without pay." Only three members of the board were in attendance and Norton's attorney appeared and addressed the board in order to secure a continuance of the hearing until next month.

Commissioner Clifton sent to a committee on the 21st a resolution to be considered on June 7, Johnson, the old night watchman who previously was the chief of the police department county building. Commissioner Clifton was present and a vigorous protest against the appointment was presented as long as he was responsible for the acts of all policemen who served during his administration, that he should at least have the naming of them. The board seemed to coincide with the chief in this view and Mr. Clifton's report was denied.

Commissioner Daily, head of the health department of the city, asked that police powers be conferred upon the sanitary department. Chief Clerk Clifton is opposed to the proposition and Mr. Daily will be heard again on the question at the next regular meeting of the board. The city recorder reported to the board that the Council had decided to take no steps towards increasing the water pressure until next fall. As to the charges filed against Officer Carahan by the board, the board decided to take no steps towards increasing the water pressure until next fall.

A. T. Schroeder's Poll Tax. The demurrer of A. T. Schroeder to the complaint in the suit brought against him by Salt Lake City to collect his poll tax for 1904 was argued before Judge Merritt yesterday afternoon. The grounds of the demurrer were that the poll tax statute was unconstitutional, that the complaint did not show a compliance with the statute and that the suit should be brought in the name of the county, final superior court instead of the city. The court sustained the demurrer. The city was given leave to file an amended complaint, on the condition, however, that it must pay \$5. The amount of the tax sued for is \$5. Mr. Schroeder also raised a question as to the jurisdiction of the police court, in which the suit was commenced, to try the case, but Judge Merritt held that the police court has such jurisdiction.
