FOOD INSPECTOR.

The mayor sent in a communication in which he announced the appoint-ment of A. S. Kendall as city food inapector.

On motion of Moran the matter was referred to the sanitary committee but not until after several of the councilmen had told in glowing language what they knew about the new office-holder and his qualifications as a food inspector.

Rich asked where Mr. Kendell had obtained his experience.

Kelly responded in "Nephi, Juab County." Rich-The meat markets of "Little

Chicago" are not very large and if Mr. Kendall's experience is no larger than this burg of the far south I do not anticipate that he will serve the city very well.

Kelly-The meat markets of that city Kelly—The meat markets of that city are not very large but their beeves are whoppers — veritable mastadous. (Laughter). I will say further that I have known Mr. Kendall for years and known him well. He was a school teacher here some years ago and will serve the city with credit. He was raised in a butcher shop and will understand his business.

Moran-Oh, I know lots of members who were raised in, the butcher shops but that is no sign that we must make fond inspectors of the .

SIDEWALKS.

The city engineer sent in a communication stating that there was no or-dinance fixing the sidewalks on Fir-t street. He recommended that the width of sidewalks be fixed at about thirty per cent of the width of the streets.
