LOCAL BRIEFS.

The contractor is tearing off the roof of the old Methodist church, preparing to putting a flat roof on the reconstructed building.

"Leaves and Fishes" will be the subject of Dr. Talmage's lecture at the University Sunday school tomorrow. Special music will be provided.

The State Council of Women will meet at the Exponent office Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock. All members are urged to be present.

The ladies' auxiliary of the Temple B'nai Israel will give a rummage sale at the rear of the Lohmeyer dancing academy, Thursday, Dec. 10.

The Calanthe-Myrle lodge of Knights of Pythias will give a social and banquet next Monday night in Castle Hall to its members and invited guests.

Dealers report there are still scarce, though of timothy there seems to be plenty. Oats are reported as stiffening in price, while wheat continues steady.

The directors of the D. A. & M. society are beginning to talk up plans for the state fair of 1904, which will be the best the state will have seen to date.

The adulterated lard complained of earlier in the week has entirely disappeared from the local market, as the dealers were afraid of the food inspectors.

Forest Dale is being provided with 32 candlepower incandescent lamps at each street intersection, so that the town will be pretty well lighted at night.

The regular meeting of the Women's Democratic club will be held at the residence of Mrs. S. A. Kenner, 336 South Eighth East street, Wednesday, Dec. 10, at 8:30 p. m.

"Booster buttons" have been got out by the Real Estate association, and the legend "Everybody Boost Salt Lake." The association has had made 6,000 of these buttons. They are of blue enamel with letters in yellow.

F. D. Yaw, a Salt Lake stock dealer, was badly bruised the other day by the wrecking of the caboose of a freight train in which he was riding, in Indiana. Mr. Yaw was removed to the nearest hospital, where he was satisfactorily cared for.

A fellow giving the name of E. M. Killgrew, was arrested by Officer Jim Williams last evening for impersonating an officer. The man did not "speak" peanuts, but went down Victoria alley "arresting" people and demanding bail from them. Killgrew will have a chance to explain matters to Judge Diehl.

A local dealer in electrical supplies says there has been a great rush among people to go into the business, which has largely reduced profits, and made the rush for trade more keenly scrutinizing. Still the business continues good, only the profits are very moderate.

Secretary A. W. Raybould of the Elks will leave Sunday evening for Los Angeles to "confer" arrangements for the proposed Elks' excursion from this city to Los Angeles in February next. It is proposed to make of this the "biggest thing on ice" in the excursion history of this section of the country.

The strike of the installers and inside men at the Bell Telephone company is a relic of the past, and the young men are back to their jobs again. It happens that the three men who were discharged were "discharged for cause," and not because of their strike with any union, and their associates who "struck in sympathy" went off at half cock. So, "the incident is closed."

A real estate deal of some size has been delayed at least two weeks by the mistakes of the firm of the law who undertook to draw up the deed. He not only got the names of the parties wrong, but had the property located on the wrong plat. So the paper must be made over again and sent to New York for signatures before the transfer can be recorded here.

Advocates of the oil pavement scheme call attention to the fact that the cost is only 40 cents per square yard, while the regular asphalt pavement costs \$2.40 per square yard; and it is claimed that the former is every bit as durable as the latter. The oil used is of the asphaltum variety, containing 90 per cent of asphaltum, and is found only in California and Texas.

The increase in membership at the city library continues at an average rate of 25 new members per day. This increase for the first month the library occupied its new quarters soaring.
