Boutwell has agreed to appoint a negro named Joubert, Assessor of at New Orleans.

The House appropriation committee agreed to report back the Chilian appropriation bill as originally presented and lost in the Fortieth Congress.

The Committee on military affairs had a very interesting interview with General Sherman. The General spoke of the need of retrenchment, and said the practice of spending more money than appropriated, thus leaving a deficiency to be supplied by special appropriation must be stopped. He said that officers and men must go into the field and live in tents, instead of paying rent for quarters in cities and continuing an expensive commutation system. He said that after the consolidation already ordered is effected, there will be about seven hundred supernumerary officers, two hundred of whom can be used as post quartermasters, commissaries, etc. The remaining five hundred have no duty till vacancies occur. He thought the pay of supernumerary officers, waiting for orders, might with propriety be reduced.

San Francisco, 18.—The steamer *Monana* sailed for Panama to-day with six hundred and eighty-two thousand dollars treasure; two hundred and thirty-one thousand for New York, four hundred and two thousand for England and forty-three thousand for France.The steamer *Colorado* of Panama and the ship *Fleetwing* of New York arrived to-day. They bring dates with Alaska intelligence.

General Davis proceeded to the Indian village of Kake to punish the murderers of two white men. The place was deserted, the inhabitants receiving timely notice of the General's coming. Some articles recovered belonging to the trading schooner which left Sitka three weeks previous with three men aboard; it is inferred that the vessel was captured and the crew murdered by Indians as nothing had been heard from her since sailing.

The steamer *John L. Stephens* was seized by the revenue officers at Sitka for violation of Customs laws. A gunboat was despatched from Victoria to the scene of the late shipwreck, Nook Sound. A memorandum book was recovered showing the vessel to be the property of John Trevick of Valparaiso.The *Herald's* Washington dispatch says the army officers in Washington are discontented with the late consolidation order. Most of those who had occasion to visit Gen. Sherman in order to have the assignments changed are heartily disgusted with his bluff manner.

Boston.—The Larrabee City Treasurer and Collector, Gardiner of Maine, who has been connected with the city government for many years, is found to be a defaulter to the amount of \$50,000. His father promises to make good the amount.

Washington.—The reports that Dent will be collector for the port of San Francisco are unfounded. The President is withholding action on the Pacific coast appointments for the repeal of the Tenure of Office Bill.

Gen. Dana, of the Russia Ice Company, protests against the Senate bill to protect Alaska fur and seals, which the Hutchinson & Kohl Co. are strenuously urging.

New York.—A small boat containing twelve boxes of nitro-glycerine were discovered under the wharf at the foot of White Hall Street, yesterday, enough to blow the lower portion of the city and Brooklyn to atoms; the stuff was taken beyond the city limits by the police.

Chicago.—The *Republican's* special says it is understood that a majority of the Senate committee is opposed to Longstreet's confirmation, not specially because Longstreet was a leading rebel, but on the ground that there are many loyal men who ought to have preference in such appointments. The committee however reported back the nomination without recommendation.The *Times's* special says the next public debt statement will show the precise condition of the Treasury books at the close of business on the 31st inst., instead of being withheld for several days to await the returns from New York.The *Tribune's* special thinks the repeal of the Tenure of Office law is probable, though the movement has apparently lost strength by the manner
