#### LEWISTON.

PROTEST AGAINST VACCINATION Will Plow Up Wheat and Plant Beets - Blessed With Twins. Special Correspondence.

Lewiston, Cache County, Jan. 14 .-The health of our people is good with the exception of two or three cases of rheumatism. The vaccination rage has not struck us yet, and we think the community is wise not to accept such an abomination, for it has been proved for the last rifty years that it only disorders the blood and plants disease into healthy bodies, seven cases out of twenty. If strict quarantine was enforced smallpox would be easier held in check. As your recent correspond-ent from Wilford sald, the doctors can go around with fur coats on and with-out vaccination either and you seldom hear of doctors catching the disease, why? Because he is a scientific immune, and is onto his business; but to educate every one how to escape would mean ruin to the doctor's business. the doctors would see that persons were kept under proper quarantine, and if the officers of the law would prosecute the law breakers, then the law abiding citizen would not have to suffer with the criminal. As we are threatened with the whim of vaccination the peo ple of Lewiston protest against all such plots of doctors, and ask the legislator from our town to work against all such despotism.
