### KANSAS CITY HAS BIG BANK FAILURE

National Bank of Commerce Closed by Order of the Board of Directors.

LIABILITIES \$24,276,429.26. Since Last Statement in August Institution's Deposits Had Been Reduced Half.

President of Clearing House Says Other Banks Will Not Be Affected—Reopening is Doubtful.

Kansas City, Dec. 5.—The National Bank of Commerce of Kansas City, one of the largest in the west, with deposits of \$16,000,000, closed its doors this morning and was taken in charge by a national bank examiner upon order of the controller of currency.

Other local banks were not seriously affected by the failure. At several banks heavy deposits were made.

The bank has been closed by order of the board of directors. It is in the hands of James T. Bradley, national bank examiner, by order of the controller of currency.

The bank had been in a weakened condition since its last statement, which was issued Aug. 22 last. At that time it had a deficit of \$1,000,000. The clearing house closed to a million dollars from the financial disturbance came to the clearing house decided to suspend the bank's clearing.

### CONFERENCE IS ON IN SMELTER CASE

Alliance of Farmers Through Executive Committee, Meet Officials of Utah Con.

ON THE HIGHLAND BOY PLANT Agreement May Be Reached by Which Smelter Will Decide Not to Appeal.

After the failure of a spectacular attempt to bring the Salt Lake valley farmers, the smeltermen, and the mine owners together for a conference two weeks ago, there is being held this afternoon an important meeting between the citizen's committee, representing an alliance of farmers and officials of the Utah Consolidated Mining company.

The conference is a similar one to that held between the same committee and representatives of the American Smelting & Refining company, at which previous damages were adjusted, and an arrangement made by which the smelter could continue in operation.

The National Bank of Commerce was the Kansas City correspondent of quite a number of Utah banks, but it is said that they all have been steadily drawing away from Kansas City of late months. The action of the Kansas City banks since the recent financial troubles across has made them regarded almost as an "outlaw" by other banks of the country.
