Left Notes to Friends Telling of His Rashness and Giving Instructions

The remains of William E. Terhune, whose suicide was noted in yesterday's "News," lie in the morgue of S. D. Evans, preparatory to interment, and his death is the subject of sad remark, particularly in the mining community, where he was so well known. His mind seems to have been unsettled by the death, in May, 1901, of his daughter Olive, to whom he was much attached, and then, his friends say, he was prone to mental irregularities from hereditary causes. W. H. Tremayne, who has known Terhune for 20 years, stated yesterday afternoon at the undertak-er's: "I knew it would come to this; and have been looking for it for some time. He has time and again taiked about taking his own life." Terhune was an expert metallurgist and mining chemist, and has been in this country for 20 years, most of the time with the Hanauer smelter, of which he was for a time superintendent. But for the past few months, he has been connected with a mining plant at Wells, Nev. The advent of the smelter trust left

Only One Fifth of Stock Subscribed

For When Lists Closed. Copenhagen, Nov. 6 .- The time for subscribing to the stock of the Danish West Indian company has expired. Of the \$1,000,000 nominal capital only one fifth was subscribed for, notwithstanding the advertisement given to the concern by King Christian and Crown Prince Frederick taking stock. The promoters, who are anti-salers, are downcast because of the weakness of the sentiment in favor of alding the Danish West Indies. The leaders of the movement intend to appeal to King George of Greece Queen Alexandra and

George of Greece, Queen Alexandra and the dowager czarina of Russia to buy shares. The banks and a few individuals will probably face the matter and stand the losses since the treaty providing for the sale of the Danish West Indies to the United States was rejected partly on account of their promises.
