REPUBLICAN PLOT FRUSTRATED.

Boston, Feb. 9.-Some remarkable demonstrations were given in public to-day by L. T. Cooper, who is introduc-ing for the first time in Boston the ing for the first time in Hoston the preparations which created a sensation in other cities recently visited by him. Cooper is a remarkable character, with peculiar and orginal ideas, and

with peculiar and orginal ideas, and the announcement of his coming to the Hub City created widespread interest. As a consequence, when it was learn-ed that he would appear in public, the place selected for his headquarters was crowded, some coming merely to get a glimpse of the man himself, others to test his skill in overcoming disease. As nearly as could be learned the facts in regard to the demonstration were these: thes

At 2 o'clock in the afternoon the young man agreed to show what one of his remedies would do for deafness, and agreed to make any one present who was afflicted with deafness hear again in less than three minutes.

There were many deaf people pres-ent and about a dozen of these were given the demonstration, consisting of a single application of one of the Cooppreparations.

a single application of one of the Coop-er preparations. The hearing of these people was then tested after an interval of between two and three minutes. The test con-sisted of questions put to them in an ordinary conversational tone at dis-tances varying from five to thirty feet. The results were remarkable in the extreme. Some of these people who were treated had been deaf for a num-ber of years. When the first question was asked, a look of amazement would gread over their faces and they would forget to answer the question. As the questions were repeated the surprised look would give way to one of delight. Many were so affected that they burst into tears and were scarcely able to answer the question. In no single instance, so far as could

answer the question. In no single instance, so far as could be learned, would an individual fail to hear. Many were able to hear a finger snap at a distance of thirty feet. At the request of Mr. Cooper, questions were put to them by their friends, or by various spectators, in an ordinary tone of Voice, and the questions were readily answered. In giving an account of these demsetting up a similar assertion in behalf of its committee,

PROBABLY A DULL SUMMER.

Money is Easy and Hard to Lend-Bear Operations Mainfest from Time to Time,

New York, Feb. 9.-Speculative ac tivity in the securities market came almost to a halt last week in the midst of the uncertainties presented by the accumulating evidence of the shrinkage of the business and industries of the country and the symptoms of political activity in the form of public utterances by persons conspicuous in politcal affairs. The world of the stock market has felt itself inveighed against by both of the great political parties

and has conceived that the heat of the coming campaign will see a continuance of this policy in the shaping of the oratory and public discussion incident to the canvass of candidates for the

to the canvass of canaldates for the presidency. A discouraging effect on active opera-tions in the stock market is argued from this prospect, and a summer of dullness and neglect of the market is looked forward to, which offers little inducement to present embarkation on speculative ventures. The immediate effect of the neglected condition of the market has been to leave it open to shifting influences of small or profes-

tion. Statistics of the Iron and steel trade for January showed the process of contraction still in progress. Esti-mates of 375,000 freight cars idle on Feb, 6 left no room for inferences of a revival in freight traffic. Reports of railroad earnings coming to hand hore the clear reflection of the effects of the great increase in traffic the country over. 

He says that three days before the assassina-tions the police are said to have dis-covered great stores of bombs and arms in the hands of members of the Republican party, and it was revealed that the Republicans intended to at-tack the police depots and, under the solders and sailors from their alle-giance to the monarchy by asserting that a republic had been proclaimed. In revenge for the discovery and spondent, a small section of the mili-tiant Republicans resolved to murder France and the entire royal family. 


