TIDINGS FROM AULD SCOTLAND.

Something of the Land o' Cakes, "Scor Dook" and Kind-Hearted People,

HEAVY RAINFALL THIS SEASON

A Trip Through Ayrshire, the Home Of the Poet Burns-Outlook for Missionary Work.

Glasgow, Scotland, Oct. 28. - The rich are becoming more proud and vain, and the poor more and more oppressed and downtrodden, and high and low are far estranged from God, so much so that this land and the people are under a heavy blight. If the heavens weep or the Lord "reserveth wrath for His enemies," then this country and people are surely under condemnation. Rarely a day passes without a heavy shower of rain, but the rainfall this season has far exceeded any since the establishment of the weather bureau throughout the country 40 years ago. Paisley, Greenock, Glasgow, Leith and Aberdeen lead out, in the order of the towns named, with the heavlest rainfall, last month. Crops, particularly oats, which is the main crop raised, is rotting in the fields all over the country. The writer has seen the country at close range for over 200 miles, and has seen and handled the decaying grain. "Sun-ny Ayrshire," as far as the grain fields can be seen from the highest rolling can be seen from the highest rolling hills (the whole county is rolling hills) oats and other grain stand in shucks where cut, but many fields of grain are uncut and crushed that to the ground by the heavy winds and rain. It is re-ported that one farmer has become in-sane because of the loss of his crops. During the last two weeks we went as for earth as Mathole which is ning During the last two weeks we went as far south as Maybole, which is nine miles south from the cottage where the Scottish poet, Robert Burns, was born. The grounds about the old thatched house where the poet was born, and the grounds there and at the monument erected to his memory and the live hedge surrounding the same are well kent by expert gardeners constantly kept by experi gardeners constantly employed at both places. The monument is about a quarter of

a mile from the cottage, on the opposite side of the country street and scene, and is situated close to the River Doon, made famous in song: "Ye banks and braces o' bonnie Doon," etc. We travbraces o' bonnie Doon," etc. We trav-eled on foot from Glasgow to Ruther-glen, then on the main road to Kilmar-nock, thence on through the auld toon o' Ayr to Maybole, on the low road from Burns' monument, crossing the auld brig o' Doon on the way. It is a small bridge and on every stone on the dykes (both walls) of the bridge are initials of names cut in the stones so dykes footh wais) of the bridge are initials of names cut in the stones so close to each other that it is difficult to read but a very few of the initials. Scotchmen and "mony ithers" in all countries of the world know of the drunken spree of "Tam O'Shanter." and the uncanny (dangerous) time he had when on his way home frac the Air market, hotly pursued by a legion of witches flying through the air to catch him, saying "wi 'mony an eldritch (un-earthly) screech and hollow."

Any article published in the newspapers against our people is printed with glar-ing headlines, and the largest size type used on the posters of events placed in their windows, pasted on the streets in their windows, pasted on the streets in all directions by the newsboys and women, and posted on all the small billboards in front of all the shops where newspapers are sold. With very rare exceptions, the newspaper men will not publish our side of the question. We have visited the editors in their offices and presented answers to charges made against our Church, and while

they acted gentlemanly they politely refused to publish our respectful re-plies. There are very few people met in this country who have not heard the sound of "the everlasting Gospel." The police protection of the Elders while preaching the Gospei on the pub-lic streets throughout Sectiand is the best in the world.

While Scotland has perhaps furnished the least members to the Caurch during the last six years of any mission, the Elders are very much encouraged in their labors from the fact that there are some applicants at this time for baptism, and a brighter ray of light now dayna than has during the period now dawns than has during the period named for new additions to the Church.
