The Peace Question Not Yet Settled. PESTH, 25.—A special says the Austrian cabinet will inform Ignatieff that it still considers the reforms proposed by Count Audressy to be the best means of preserving peace and ameliorating the condition of the Christians in Turkey. Andrassy will propose that Russia and Turkey demobilize simultaneously, and it is hoped that Russia will consent. The Ports has informed Montenegro that it will submit to the Turkish Parliament, next week, for final decision, the concessions which it is willing to grant to Montenegro, and will also submit therewith the Montenegrin demands.

A Berlin correspondent tele graphs: "I can affirm, confidently, that the Porte, on the 20th instant, informed the Powers that it would, under ne circumstances, yield as-sent to the Russian protocol, if the document required Turkey to de mobilize before Russia."
