

O. U. W. MONEY **GIVEN TO HEIRS**

Funds of Dissolved Association **Apportioned to Beneficiaries** By Judge Howell.

CHOIR MAKES HIT IN LOGAN.

Holdups Badly Use Two Victims-Brakeman Harry Brown Sertously Injured.

Ogden, June 13 .- In the Second district court Judge J. A. Howell rendered a lengthy decision in the case of William Harcombe plaintiff against Margaret Edwards et al, beneficiaries in the A. O. U. W. lodge, which dissolved some months ago on account of financial difficulties.

There came into the hands of the officers of the court, the sum of \$20,695.81, from which was deducted the sum of \$230.80 because it covered indebtedness created prior to the receivership, leavcreated prior to the receivership, leav-ing the sum of \$20,465.01 actually to be litigated. The court costs amounted to \$80.28, the sum of \$500 was allowed as attorney's fees for the plaintiff and re-ceiver, and \$250 as compensation for the receiver, leaving a balance of \$19,-648.73 to be distributed among the de-fendant beneficiaries, so that the ex-penses of this entire litigation and dis-tribution of this money to the widows and orphans who are entitled to it was a little over four per cent of the entire amount, certainly a record seldom, if ever equalled in the history of juris-prudence.

The court after reviewing the case and quoting authorities made the fol-lowing order in the case: It is therefore ordered, adjudged and decreed that the persons named on the tabulated list hereto attached as the beneficiaries of the deceased members whose names appear on said list are entitled out of the funds now in the hands of the county treasurer, in pur-suance of the order of the court, to the amounts set opposite their names, and if, after the findings of fact, conclu-sions of law and decree are made in ac-cordance therewith, no appeal there-from be taken, the said county treas-turer is authorized and directed to pay out of moneys in his hands the said sums to the said beneficiarles, or their attorneys of record, taking receipts for the same, except that he is directed to retain in his hands until the further order of the court shall determine to whom the said sum shall be paid among the various claimants thereto, namely, Laura A. Pitts, Frank Crocker, Julius Doebler, Louis Messer, J. Bena-tile and Louisa Mills. He is directed also to retain in his hands the sum of \$555, the amount to which the benefici-arles of George W. Some of the men continued working at the new boat, while others were still engaged in ferrying the wa-gons of the Missourians over; and it was concluded to wait another day, to assist in finishing the new boat and to take the provisions which would be realized from the ferrying.
