The funeral cortege was headed by Foster's Military band, which discoursed sad strains of funeral music en route to the ceremetry and played "Nearer My God to Thee" at the grave side.

Croft's, residence about three miles west of Deseret, stating that he wanted to be shown the commissary at Calientes. In the meantime County Commissioners A. M.
