Number of Big Baseball Deals Under Way—Cubs' Chance for National Pennant in 1910.

New York, Oct. 28.—A number of deals which are now under way and which are said to have received the sanction of the owners of the clubs, will affect alter the personnel of several of the major league baseball clubs next season. Manager McGraw of the New York Nationals, has arranged to trade Pitcher George Sisler and shortstop, Harry Davis, to the Chicago Nationals for Johnny Kling, the catcher who refused to play with Chicago last season, according to an undoubted authority. Mike Donlin, the manager of the Boston Americans, arrangements with McGraw last season, will go to Philadelphia in exchange for Sherwood Magee, according to the same authority and Fred Merkle and Charlie Terhune, the players who were managers in his company, are to go to St. Louis in exchange for Ed Konstey.

McGraw has refused to make public

any details of the deal with Chicago, but is compelled to offer Wilcox, who is liked by Manager Frank Chance and \$2,000 besides, thus making Kling a \$5,000 asset. It is figured that these three deals will materially strengthen the teams involved.
