Areas of low pressure are central over Brit-ish Columbia, southern plateau and New England coast. During the past 24 hours showers have occurred over portions of New Mexico, Texas, Arkan-eas, Michigan and the gulf and Atlantic coast states. Over the remainder of the country fair weather was general.
