The newest and best paying field of exploitation for aspiring women designers and illustrators is that of making pictures to go with advertisements. The illustration of advertisements is really a branch of art, and a very important one, a branch, too, that is as yet only in its infancy. There are women writers of advertisements, but they have become so many that there is no foothold for newcomers. In making pictures for advertisements after they are written, however, there are great possibilities.

Artists of established reputation are occasionally willing to illustrate advertising matter on the quiet if they are well paid for it, but on no account would they permit their names to be used in connection with the pictures. Why it is hard to understand. Certainly a million persons will see and admire such an illustration where a thousand perhaps will see and appreciate a triumph in the domain of what painters themselves call "art." The highest of all real art is that which puts attractiveness into the presentment of common things that common people see every day and understand.
