One of the world's greatest dams will be the Roosevelt dam, now being-built be the Roosevelt dam, now being-built across the gorge between the moun-tains through which runs the Salt River, in the Apache mountains, 78 miles northeast of Phoenix, Arizona. This dam will be 270 feet high and will store more than three times as much water as the Assuan dom on the Nile water as the Assuan dam on the Nile. It will make fertile 272,000, acres of des-

The little town of Roosevelt, with The inthe town of Roosevelt, with a population of 2,000, and with electric lights, churches, schools, etc., will be destroyed; it is in the valley just above the dam. But 50,000 people will find homes and sustenance on what is now actus and sage-brush.
