banquet to Commemorate Concession—School Election.

Lehi, Utah Co., July 10.—A meeting of the Lehi Commercial club will be held this evening to make further preparations to entertain the Commercial club and mayor of Lehi, Utah, at a banquet to be given Tuesday evening at Lehi at a grand banquet and ball. The function is given to celebrate the inauguration of free telephone service in Utah county over the Independent telephone, which went into effect at 10 o'clock this morning, and a 5 cent rate on the Bell which will go into effect Aug. 1. It is expected the ball will fall in line with a free service. It was the Lehi Commercial club thought of getting the banquet and took the initiative in the matter with the aid of committees from the other Commercial clubs of the county and cities, pushed the matter of free telephone service to such success. The banquet will be given in the Opera House and the ball in the city pavilion.
