FOREIGN.

LONDON, 11.—The Times, in a leading editorial, contends that Russia must submit every one of the peace conditions to the congress, not excepting the indemnity clause. "She has no right," says the article, "to be dictator over Turkey. The great powers did not invite her to make war, or give her a commission to replace the government of the Porte in any way she may think fit." The Times also eulogizes the government's action in bringing forward the Greek claims. It says: "No decision so patriotic and far-seeing has been taken by the cabinet in many a day as the step proposing that Greece should be represented at the conference. It recognizes that the old state of things can not be restored and that the best materials for replacing it are to be found in the Hellenic race."

CONSTANTINOPLE, 11.—The Czar is expected to ratify the treaty Saturday or Sunday.

The Grand Duke Nicholas has telegraphed the Czar that he will return to St. Petersburg immediately after he has visited the Sultan. The Czar has replied, desiring him to remain. The Porte has appointed one Koras Sandjian as political agent in attendance upon the Grand Duke.

LONDON, 12.—A special from Berlin reports that Prince Bismarck will go to his Lauenburg estates for the improvement of his health, and remain there until the meeting of congress.

The Standard reports that all homeward-bound men-of-war have been ordered to be detained at Malta to strengthen the fleet in eastern waters.

Reouf Pasha and Gen. Ignatieff arrived at Adessa, yesterday, and immediately took train for St. Petersburg.

A correspondent at Vienna says: It is stated that Reouf Pasha bears an autograph letter from the Sultan to the Czar, as well as the ratification of the treaty.

Russia has not yet sent a positive reply to Austria's request to fix the date between March 25th and 31st, for the meeting of congress. Prince Gortschakoff hesitates on account of his recent illness.

Russia still maintains the view that only the part of the treaty affecting European interests should be submitted to the congress. There is little doubt that Austria will support Great Britain in advocating the claims of Greece to be represented in the congress.

In answer to an inquiry in the House of Commons, this afternoon, Sir Stafford Northcote said the government has not heard that the Prussians were intrenching lines on the peninsula of Gallipoli.

Verner Brothers, stock brokers, failed, it is stated, with liabilities heavy and assets small. They were bears of a large amount of consols and British railway securities.

The Times says they entered into a large gamble in hopes that the country would rush into war, and the past fortnight's rise proved too much for them. Should the rise continue, more collapses are probable.

PARIS, 12.—The Republique Francaise states Lord Derby told Count Schouvaloff, the Russian ambassador at London, that England would not attend the congress unless the entire treaty of San Stefano was submitted, and that Schouvaloff, after consulting Gortschakoff, replied that Russia would consent, the congress itself deciding what points ought to be examined.

VIENNA, 12.—The sub-committee of the Hungarian Delegation unanimously adopted the motion to grant the credit of the 60,000,000 of florins asked for by Andrassy.

ROME, 12.—A dispatch states that measures are impending against certain persons of high position at the Vatican, for instigating the mutiny among the Swiss guards.

LONDON, 12.—A terrible colliery explosion occurred in the Unity Brook Pit, Kearsley, near Bolton, yesterday afternoon. The mouth of the pit was blocked until six o'clock, when the explorers succeeded in entering. At last accounts they had found 15 corpses. Forty men were working in the pit at the time of the explosion, and it is certain that all perished.

A Berlin dispatch says it is reported that Count Andrassy informed the Hungarian budget committee that Austria would

never consent to the extension of Bulgaria to the Aegean Sea or to the Russian occupation of the province for more than six months.

General Krudener, who was waiting to be tried by a court martial for his defeat at Pleyna, has been released from arrest and appointed assistant commander of Warsaw.

Prince Hassan has refused to obey the order of the Porte to evacuate Varna, declaring that he awaits the Khedive's order. There is some agitation in Syria in favor of annexation to Egypt.

A dispatch from Pera states that the Porte has decided to send two army corps to Volo to crush the Thessalian insurgents and a squadron to prevent aid from Greece.

It is thought the congress will meet about April 10th, and that real business will commence April 15th.

A telegram received in Paris from Athens states that the Czar has given notice of his consent to the admission of Greece to the congress.

Several deputies of the Hungarian delegation have declared they would not regard the passage of the credit as a vote of confidence in the government.

A dispatch from Constantinople reports that the Russians have occupied Wekerekevi, half an hour's march from Budukere, on the Bosphorus. They also occupy the majority of the villages around Constantinople, and continue advancing towards the city.

Bucharest papers mention a rumor that Germany and Austria would consent to the retrocession of Bessarabia if the mouths of the Danube were left in possession of Roumania.

A dispatch from Belgrade says: Seven thousand men of the Servian army of the Drina have been disbanded.

In the House of Commons, tonight, the motion of Ashley, censuring Layard, British ambassador at Constantinople, in connection with the affair of the Negroponte correspondence, was rejected—206 to 132.

VIENNA, 12.—At the sitting of the sub-committees of the Hungarian delegation, to-day, Count Andrassy stated that Government had been throughout disposed to recognize the independence but not the neutrality of Roumania. Herr Wahrman protested that the Hungarian delegation was not ruled by a warlike feeling, but it calmly and steadily declared its readiness to enter upon war if unavoidably necessary. Several members expressed their concurrence in this view.

HAVANA, 12.—The surrender of the insurgent chiefs and followers still continues.

PARIS, 12.—A special from Constantinople states that the Sultan has summoned Prince Hassan, of Egypt, to Constantinople. It is said the Prince is implicated in a conspiracy with Suleiman Pasha. The chief Pasha is going to Constantinople to intercede for him.

ST. PETERSBURG, 12.—The Journal de St. Petersburg declares untenable the reported English demand that all points of the treaty should be submitted to the congress. If the mission of congress is to result in peace, subjects not of a European character, and which might lead to excited but resultless discussion, must be set aside.
